DAVID E. BASTEDO

David Edgar Bastedo, a lifelong citizen of Muskoka and of Bracebridge for 40 years, passed away Sunday evening after several weeks of illness. For many years he was editor of Muskoka Herald, and was Sheriff of Muskoka till 1922. He was a strong Conservative, always active in politics and a splendid organizer. He was a member of Muskoka A. F. & A. M., I. O. O. F. and L. O. L. Besides his widow, the following children survive: Frank, Regina, Saak, Robert H., Sterling, William, Toronto. Dr. A. F. Bastedo, Bracebridge; Mrs. Grisdland of Toronto and Mrs. Marsh of St. Thomas.

J. M. Moore, proposed by Le Roy Dale and D. McIntyre.

At the close of the nominations Clerk Heath was elected to the chair and called on the candidates who responded as follows:

Mr. Le Roy Dale was the first speaker. It was his seventh consecutive term in office and if Mr. McIntyre would accept the office of Mayor he would willingly withdraw. He explained the various items in the statement and gave a concise report of the work of Council during the past year. He advocated economy in 1926.

Reeve McIntyre referred to financial matters in connection with the High School, and the necessity of a fire alarm system in town. He spoke at length on County affairs and gave the ratepayers a lot of information regarding the financial situation in the County. At the present time the bonded indebtedness of the County was \$100,000. He would advocate a policy of "pay as you go" in County road construction in 1926.

Wm. Long, Chairman of Finance, dealt with matters pertaining to the town debenture debt, etc.

Wm. Ashenurst, Chairman of Streets and Works, spoke regarding the work of his department during the year.

Wm. Barclay, Chairman of the Building and Property Committee, spoke of the work of his department and advocated a scheme for the perpetual upkeep of the cemetery.

G. C. Campbell, Chairman of the Charity, Light and Police Committee, dealt with matters in these departments.

Angus Duncan, Chairman of the Waterworks Committee, spoke regarding the town's splendid water supply and would like to see a fire alarm system installed.

John D. Kelly, Chairman of Printing and Contingencies, spoke regarding the expenditure in his department.

D. Crichton, Chairman of the Public School Board, explained the expenditure of the Board during the year and reported a balance of some \$1700 on hand.

Mr. J. B. Mackenzie, who is retiring from the Board, and Mr. W. H. Kentner also spoke briefly.

The personnel of 1926 Town Council remains exactly the same as last year. In the School Board there is one change, Mr. J. B. Mackenzie having retired, Mrs. J. G. Russell will be the new member.
