FREDERICK MITCHELL
Frederick G. Mitchell of 618 Wellington Street, for years a prominent business man of London, died Sunday morning, Dec. 13th, after an extended illness. He was born in Georgetown, Ont., sixty years ago, and came to London when a young man, having resided for some time previously in Newfoundland. He began life as a stationery engineer here, and later established the London Engine Supplies Company. Mr. Mitchell had always taken a deep interest in municipal affairs, and had been an Alderman and a member of the former Board of Control of this city, later sitting for ten years on the Public Utilities Commission. He was a member of St. John's Lodge, No. 20, A.F. and A.M., and of St. Andrew's United Church. The funeral was held on Tuesday.

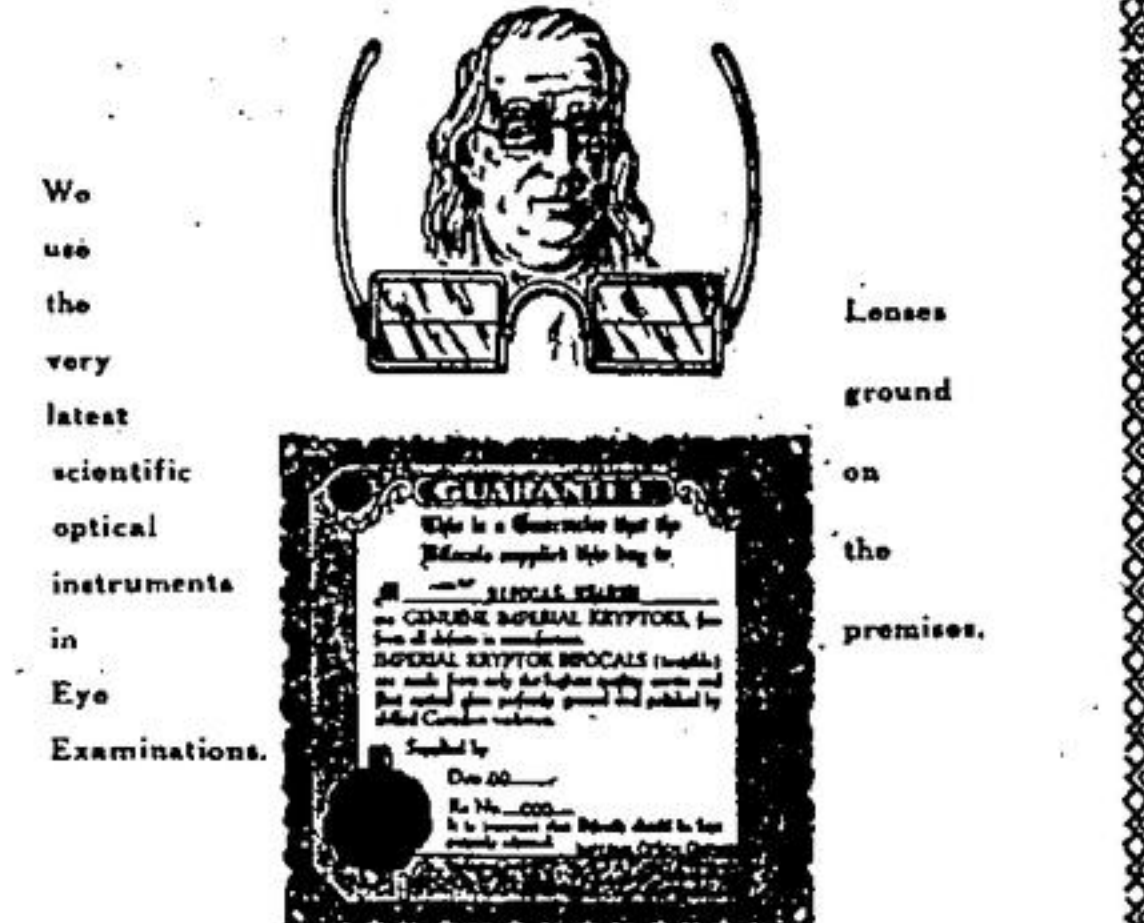
