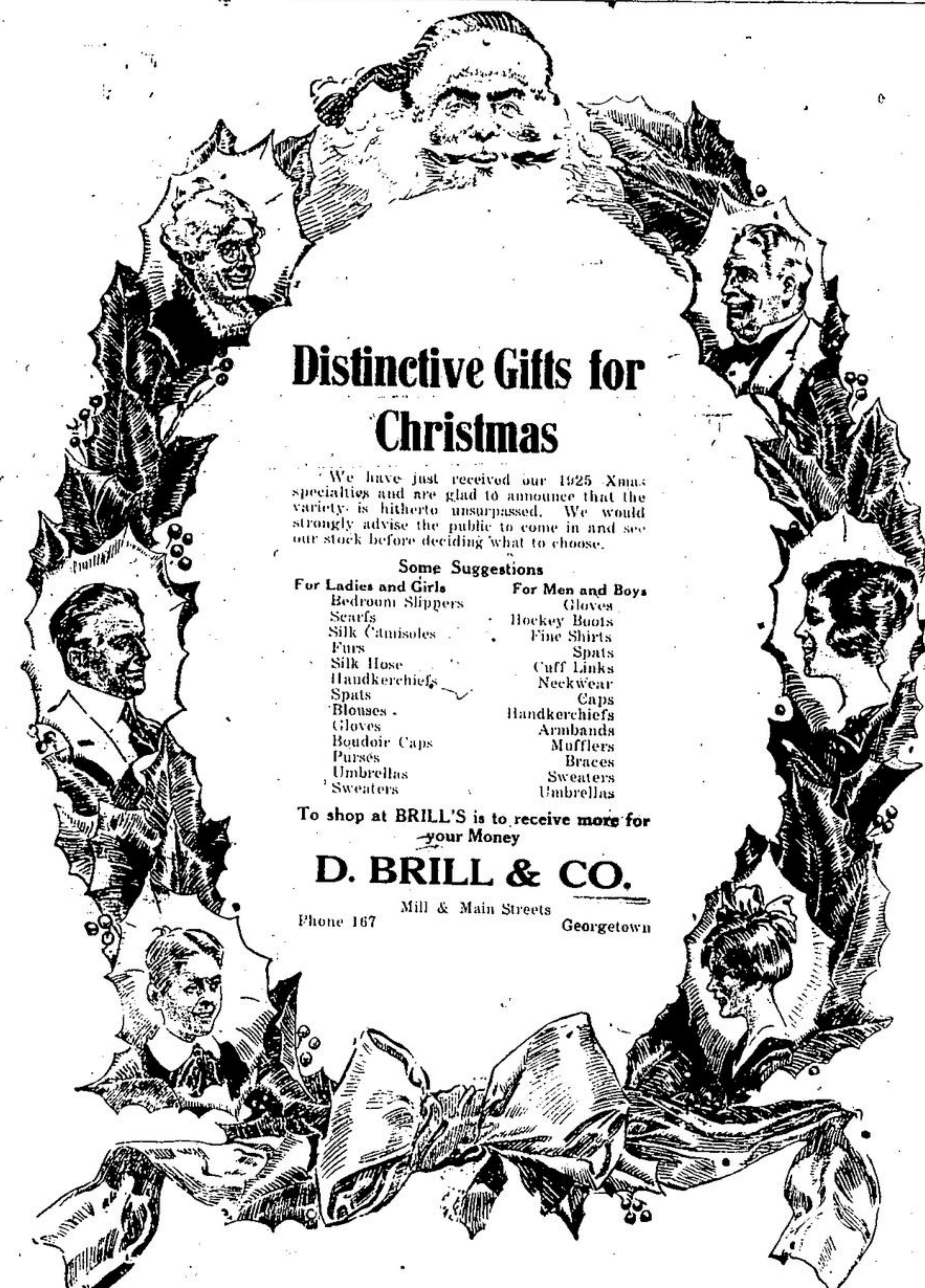

MILTON  
For some time there has been no unemployment problem in Milton, but that happy state of affairs has come to an end for a time, perhaps until next spring. About two weeks ago the Toronto Brick Co., Ltd. laid off a large number of hands. The Milton Press, and other newspapers, are doing so many men, though temporary, will be a serious matter for them and their families.

At a meeting of the Board of Management of the Gordon Home, the following resolution was passed: That we recommend that Mr. C. H. Stuart, Treasurer of the Board of Management, open a separate account for the rebuilding and refurnishing fund, and that if the cheque for the insurance for the Home be made payable to the county council, that we ask them to endorse it to a committee appointed for the purpose of rebuilding the Home, said committee to be comprised of Messrs. Blain, McIntyre, Earl, Little, Burton and Riddell.

On Dec. 11th, J. H. Turner, of Trafalgar Township, near Milton, exhibited in Milton what is believed to be the largest table carrot ever seen in the Dominion. Its length is 8 inches, it is 17 inches in circumference and weighs 3 pounds. It seems funny that the higher the price of eggs goes the fewer eggs our hens lay. They seem to think they don't have to lay as many to produce the same value. Hens are like the coal miners—keep down production, keep up the price and take a holiday every fall.

As Brampton will celebrate Derry Day next August, for the first time in the history of the town, there is great activity among the members of Canon Walsh R.B.P. No. 111, and at the annual meeting, held last night, all reports showed that plans are maturing successfully, and that a big day may be expected.

The total numbers of prisoners confined in Brampton jail this year was 66, 32 being males. The smallest jail population at one time was 1, the highest 7. The principal charges against the prisoners were violation of the Ontario Temperance Act and theft. The cost of the prisons per prisoner per diem was very nearly 14 cents.

A military career of more than 113 years as an army post will close for Fort Porter, near Buffalo, some time before October 1, 1926, when the garrison will depart. The fort will be turned over to the city for use in connection with a new bridge across the Niagara River and Black Rock Harbor. The post has been purchased by the City of Buffalo for \$400,000. The money is to be used for building houses for a battalion of infantry at Madison Barracks, New York.
