



Workmen's Compensation

The workmon's Compensation Board for the Province of Ontario has just issued a statement show ing that the Board awarded \$5.566 448.50 in benifits during 1926 This figure is noticeably lower than the tatal for 1924 which was \$6,122, 820.84. While componen tion awarded has been less, the total number of accidents report ed has been greater, amounting m 1925 to 60,012 as compared with 58,675 during 1921. One notable feature of the accident statistics. however, is the decrease in fatali ties, the total number of fatalities in 1926 being 845 which is consid erably less than the figures for 1921 which were set at 402. This alone is a most important item to the

. Province. It is evident from the figures issued by the Board that while min or accidents show an - increase, probably due in part to better reparting, the serious and more cost is types of accidents are on the down grade. In this connection, Mr. V A. Sinclair, R. C., Chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Board, giving out the figures for 1925, states:

"There has been a great deal of 'attention paid during the prosent year to accident prevent "ion work, which no doubt has been in some measure at least responsible for the lessened cost of compensation, and the safety organizations are expect ing to carry on a much more intensive campaign during the coming year and they are in hopes thereby to reduce the frequency, soverity, and costs of accidents in all classes." During the year the Workmen's Componsation Board handled an enormous amount of mail, this averaging each day between 5,000 and 6,000 letters going in and out.
