The honors in this period went to the visitors who succeeded in getting the rubber past Holloway for two corners while Georgetown on one piece of individual work scored. Georgetown's only tally.
 The second period was not quite as fast as the first and both teams were beginning to feel the effects of the fast pace. Reid opened the scoring for Georgetown with a nice shot from the wing which was too hot for Cantelon to handle, and shortly afterward Howitt bulged the twins for another corner. On an individual rush by Chambers Milton secured another goal. It was at this stage of the game that Referee Findon found it necessary to hand out several penalties and as many warnings. Georgetown was successful in scoring another anking the score at the end of the second period 4 to 3 in favor of Georgetown.
 The third period was all Milton's and they succeeded in scoring five in quick succession while Georgetown could only find the net once making the final score 8 to 5 in favor of Milton.
