**Obituary**  
**JAMES ALFRED OWENS**  
Following a severe illness of sev-  
eral months' duration, James Al-  
fred Owens passed away at his  
home, Queen St., Georgetown, on  
January 19th. Deceased was an  
only son of the late Mr. and Mrs.  
James Owens and was born in  
Glenwilliam on Feb. 22nd, 1859.  
When a small child his parents  
moved to Bolton Village where he  
spent the greater part of his school  
days. When he was about four  
teen years of age they moved to  
his grandfather's farm on the 10th  
line, Esquesing, near Glenwilliam,  
where he resided until 10 years  
ago when he moved to Geor-  
getown. In 1902 he was appointed  
a Justice of the Peace and still  
held that office at his death. He  
took great pleasure through this  
office in helping anyone connected  
with the Great War, who sought  
his help to get their just dues. He  
was approached many times for  
public office, but did not care to  
accept, always desiring a quieter  
life. He was a Liberal in politics  
and a Presbyterian in religion.  
Mr. Owens was twice married,  
first in 1888 to Letty A. Leslie and  
of this union one daughter, Mrs.  
P. E. MacDonell, Chingwood, Ont.,  
survives. Second, in 1890 to An-  
nie Sloan, who still survives, and  
also their daughter, Edith V., of  
Branwood School, Oakville. He  
is also survived by one sister, Mrs.  
J. F. Gamble, Lenex, Sask., and  
four grandchildren.  
In the passing of Mr. Owens,  
Georgetown loses one of her best  
citizens and a man who was hon-  
ored and respected throughout the  
entire community. The funeral  
took place on Thursday afternoon  
when the remains were laid to rest  
in the family plot in Glenwilliam  
Cemetery, the service being con-  
ducted by Rev. Kenneth MacLean  
of Knox Presbyterian Church.  
There were many beautiful floral  
tributes. A large gathering of  
friends from Toronto, Weston,  
Sheridan, Acton, Brampton and  
surrounding country were present  
to pay their last respects to the  
deceased. The pall bearers were:-  
A. Clarridge, C. Cook, W. Cole, W.  
J. Campbell, J. Cleaves and M.  
Williams.

**WILLIAM HAMPSHIRE**  
William Hampshire, pioneer of  
Halton, died Sunday night at his  
residence, Esquesing Township, in  
his ninety-first year. He was born  
in Downbury, Yorkshire, England,  
in 1835 and came to Canada in  
1861, taking a position as a surveyor  
at Hagar's Brook, Brantford, Brant-  
ford, where he remained for two  
years. He then located at St.  
Helena, which place he named,  
several miles west of Milton, and  
set up the first sawmill. Moving  
to Brant Township in Bruce County,  
he cleared a bush farm, and re-  
turned to the Scotch Block, north  
of Milton. In 1860 he married  
Elizabeth McNaughton, daughter  
of John McNaughton, ex-Warden  
of Halton County. He was a  
staunch Liberal and a Presby-  
terian. He was a member of the  
Session of Boston Church for more  
than 40 years and a Sunday School  
teacher for nearly 20 years. He  
was a member of Walker Masonic  
Lodge, Acton. Three sons and one  
daughter survive, John Hampshire  
and W. J. L. Hampshire, ex-Reeve  
of Esquesing Township, Joseph  
Hampshire of New Westminster,  
B.C., and Miss Janet Hampshire  
of home.

was 86 years of age and was born

legate to the Synod while Mr. Bob  
Corke was re-elected as Vestry  
Clerk. Messrs. K. L. Wilson, Wal-

E. Young were added to the list  
of Sidersmen. The following were  
elected to the Board of Manage-  
ment:- Mrs. D. L. Herbert, Messrs.  
Wallace Thompson, J. Price, D. L.  
Herbert, H. Corke, J. B. Wallace,  
B. Thompson, D. P. O'Connell and  
the Warden, Messrs. W. F.  
Bradley and J. B. Wallace were

**Canadian Tuberculosis Association**

Do you know that this Association is 25 years old, that during its lifetime Canada's death rate from tuberculosis has dropped from 180 per 100,000 to 82.28, and that the rate is highest in the provinces touching our two coasts?  
Do you know that this Association provided a \$50,000 fund for the purchase of a 6000 sq. ft. sanatorium in 1902. This summer, over 200 patients being referred by doctors that Ontario has provided a second travelling sanatorium, Alberta has planned in commission one and that New Brunswick proposes to employ a second one?  
Do you know that in excess of 400 sanatorium beds have been provided in Quebec and Saskatchewan during the year, that negotiations are under way to provide 450 additional adult beds and 115 children's beds during 1928, and that a bequest of \$100,000 is available to improve the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium, N. B.?  
Do you know that surveys of school age children have been undertaken in Manitoba, Alberta and New Brunswick, that the Three Rivers Demonstration has cost \$50,000 to date and has increased its population for work by 25% that Lord Atholstain's \$500,000 bequest has organized the National Anti Tuberculosis and General Health League and that Sir Adam Beck's Memorial Fund of half a million dollars is nearly complete? - R.
