Anniversary Services

Baptist Church Celebrates the Passing of Another Mile Stone. Eloquent Sermons by Rev. Dr. Brown

Anniversary services were held in the Baptist Church on Sunday last when Dr. Brown of McMaster University, Toronto, preached two eloquent sermons to large congregations.

At the morning service Dr. Brown read as the lesson part of the 4th and 5th Chapters of St. Matthew, and chose as his text, the 13th verse of the 6th chapter. "Ye are the salt of the earth, but if the salt have lost its savour, wherewith shall it be salted? It is thenceforth good for nothing, but to be cast out and to be trodden under foot of men."

The speaker said in part:—The words of the text were the greatest saying from the lips of Jesus, the full force of which can only be realized when the circumstances are taken into consideration. It was the sermon on the mount when Jesus, looking north, south, east and west over the wide world, thought of the pain, suffering and ignorance of the people, looked at his handful of disciples and said, "Ye are the salt of the earth." Salt was used as a symbol because of its great importance in the East, and other things it was the symbol of friendship. Christians are the salt of humanity and Christ was telling them what he expected of Christians, to put now savour into the life of the people and keep them sweet and clean and pure. Christ looked into the masses and saw a crushed people, slaves of a foreign power, in distress and in great spiritual need. They had come to get something to make their life was worth living. They needed Jesus to give them fresh courage and strength, and to put the now savour of cheer, love and goodwill into the life of the people. Look at the world-wide conditions to-day and it is difficult to see how the people are to be transformed by the love of Jesus Christ and the lives of holy men and women. Are you Christians the salt of this town? Are you a moral asset? If not you ought to be, and it is easy to do wrong here it is your fault. Are you helping to christianize the community by prayer and Godly lives? If not you are a terrible disappointment to Jesus Christ. If you have lost the holy influence of a holy life you are a useless creature. Have you lost your savour? The saddest of all words to-day are "He might have been" God can take the backslider who has lost his influence and restore his savour. The great need of the church to-day is a revival in the old way but a revival among Christians of the old fashioned family altar and a Christian atmosphere in the home. A half-hearted religion makes you miserable, but a whole-hearted religion makes you happy. "Ye are the salt of the earth, but if the salt has lost its savour, it is thenceforth good for nothing."

The speaker's subject at the evening service was "Redemption" and he chose his text from the 1st chapter of Ephesians, "Ye are redeemed by the blood of Christ."

The pastor, Rev. Mr. Harton assisted at the morning service. Rev. Dr. Ditchie of the United Church and Rev. Kenneth MacLean of Knox Presbyterian Church assisted at the evening service. The special music by the choir, the organ voluntaries by Miss McMaster and the solo by Mr. Scott at both services were much appreciated. Messrs. A. Herbert and O. E.
