 LIMEHOUSE
 The annual meeting of the Presbyterian congregation of Limehouse was held on Wednesday Jan. 27. A large number of the members and adherents of the congregation attended the meeting, which was opened with devotional exercises by the pastor. The statement of the financial condition for the year was reviewed in outline and the events of the past year and presented a foreward of activities for 1926. Elders will be elected in the near future and a Young Peoples Society has been organized and well attended, having committees to provide for the devotional, educational, missionary and social sides of life.

 After considering the various reports the congregation appointed a committee to consider the question of providing a new organ and to report to the Board of Managers.
 Mr. Angus Lawson and Dr. Jas. Lindsay were elected to the Managing Board and the congregation begins the new year full of enthusiasm and believing that it has an opportunity to minister effectively in its own constituency to man's highest good.
