### WHAT DO YOUR BOYS AND GIRLS READ?

It is high time that Canadian parents should be alarmed at the amount of trash in the form of sex literature, that is falling into the hands of their boys and girls. Filth from across the border flows into our Canadian homes to wreck our Canadian youth. A generation ago, we were troubled over the effect that the dime novel had upon our boys. We were grief-stricken when they held up the officials of a bank or a school, or a police officer, for the sake of the money, but to get the thrills that accompany a hold-up by an individual, a house or a railroad train. There can be no question that the literature of that period was responsible for the downfall of a number of our best men.

To a great extent, this detective blood-and-thunder stuff has been seen its day. It is supplanted by the sex story that seems to be taking the reading world by storm. The harvest of the former literature was the loss of property, freedom and life; the latter something far more valuable, the good name and morals of our young people.

What a people read, that they are, and to see where we are headed, one has but to look through the American magazines of so-called "life stories," published by concerns which know that their publications supply the demand of a class of people who are more interested in the concerns that, for the love of the young, place in the hands of the young, stories that are not true to life (though so claimed), stories that will lead youth astray much more certainly than the detective story.

### WOMEN URGED TO BUY MADE-IN-CANADA GOODS

What Canadian women can do to promote prosperity in the Dominion by changing the balance of trade in a more favorable direction was stressed by Colonel Charles McCullough, chairman of the Produced-in-Canada Committee, in his interesting address before the Canadian Business and Professional Women's Club at Toronto on Saturday last.

McCullough pointed out that 85 per cent of the advertising in the country made a direct appeal to women as buyers, and that if women used discrimination in their purchases they could request produced-in-Canada goods and restore better trade conditions with the United States. He pointed out that the United States was purchasing at the rate of \$60 per head in the United States, the United States was purchasing at the rate of \$4 per head from Canada, making a most unfavorable balance of trade.

When there was unemployment in the country it resulted in hardship for the women, who had necessarily to stretch the purse strings to meet the needs of the family. By allowing the country's money to go out to foreign countries, Canadian industries were being injured, and unemployment increased. In concluding, McCullough urged the women of Canada to buy Canadian-produced goods, and to use discrimination in their purchases as to that from other countries.

### Gas Flavors Cream.

Dairy farmers who operate their cream separators with gasoline engines should take the strictest precautions to avoid a gasoline flavor in the cream and butter, says the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

A light wooden partition between the engine and the exhaust pipe, and directing the pipe through the roof instead of through the wall, will make certain that the fumes are blown away from the cream, no matter what the direction of the wind. There should be a tight wooden partition between the direction of the most prevalent winds and the engine. The operator should take great care to avoid carrying gasoline odors on his hands and clothing, and gasoline should never be placed in a cream can, milk pail or other dairy utensil.

The manager of the scheme was convicted under the Lottery Law, and the First Divisional Court dismissed his appeal. A similar appeal from Chatham came under the same ruling.

As this method of advertising goods has been quite popular with merchants in Ontario, the ruling will have a wide application. It now appears that where a number of persons own an article in common they may raffie it among themselves, but it is illegal to sell tickets to any outside party.
