factory and anniversary occasions and the many distinguished men, including Bishops and the Lieutenant Governor of the Province, who were induced to come to us through the efforts and untiring zeal of our Rector.

It was Mr. Mayes' misfortune to come to us when Glen Williams was passing through a period of grave depression, but that did not deter him from pressing upon us needed repairs and reforms resulting in 1928 in a very substantial restoration of the church building. At Easter 1924, the Choir was vested and this not only added to the beauty and dignity of our services, but enabled them to be associated with the other vested choirs of the Diocese, and to take part with them in the Annual Choir Festival which was also inaugurated by Mr. Mayes. But this material progress so potent to all is nothing compared to his work as a faithful Parish Priest, resulting in a communicants' list three times as large as that of five years ago.

Those of us that have passed through periods of stress and trouble know how kindly sympathetic, how thoughtful and helpful he was. I must not forget to mention the successful Mission held by Rev. Hamilton Moorbridge a year ago and the deep impression it made on us as a Parish.

Two years ago the late Bishop Clark appointed Mr. Mayes a member of the Standing Committee of the Diocese in appreciation of his worth, an honor in which you as a Parish shared, as this was the first time a Rector of Georgetown and Glenwilliams was so honored. One criticism, and one only have I heard, that Mr. Mayes has not spread himself out thin over the community—to gain what I would call a cheap popularity.
