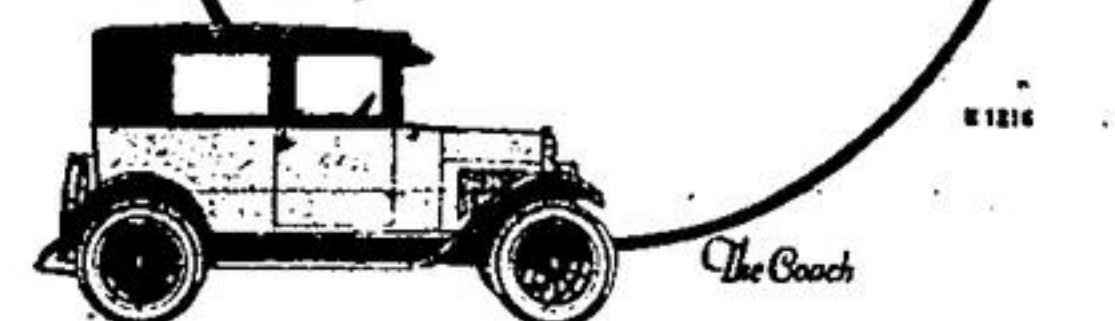

OBITUARY

Dr. Charles Ross, 62, pioneer Spokane dentist, husband of Dr. Frances Eastman Ross, widely known Spokane physician and surgeon, died on March 24 at St. Luke's Hospital, following an illness of several months. Four brothers in the family were doctors. Dr. Ross practiced until last September, when his illness forced him to retire. About four months ago he was taken to the hospital, where he remained until his death. He was widely known in dental circles throughout the northwest and was a member of the University Club, a 32nd degree Mason and a Shriner. Dr. Ross was born in 1863, at Georgetown, Ont. He received his early education there. He was graduated from the Ohio Dental College, the second oldest institution of its kind in the world, in 1890, and began active practice at Fargo, N.D. in 1904. He married Miss Frances Eastman Lockhart and two years later they came to Spokane. He is survived by his widow, who resides at the family residence, 1710 17th Avenue; four sisters, Mrs. Sarah A. Hamilton of Pullman, Miss Annie and Mrs. Laura Rose Stephens of Huntington, Quebec, and Mrs. Mary Rose Maclean of Regina, Saskatchewan; five brothers, Dr. Frank Ross, Spokane; James T. of Bronte, Ont.; William F. of Apr., N.D.; Dr. John of Chicago, and rounds out the family, town, N.D.—Spokane Daily Chronicle.
