After five years as Rector of the Parish of St. George and St. Alban, Rev. Percival Mayes is leaving for a larger field of labor as Rector of All Saints' Church, Niagara Falls. During his labors here the parish prospered wonderfully and Mr. Mayes and his good wife have endeared themselves in the hearts of their people.

On Monday evening a farewell banquet was held in the Sunday School Room of St. George's Church, when over two hundred Anglicans and representatives from other churches sat down to tastefully arranged tables laden with a homelike supply of the choicest viands procurable.
