Killed Raccoons, Fined in Court
A Police Court case of interest to farmers generally was tried before Police Magistrate Moore at Milton last week. John W. Miller and Roy Cook, farmers of Trafalgar Township were summoned to court by Deputy Game Warden George Buck of Milton, charged with unlawfully destroying a raccoon's place of habitation and selling the skins of fur-bearing animals without a license.
A coon tree was discovered on Miller's farm and as the farmers had been missing poultry they decided to cut down the tree and get the coons. The tree was felled, Cook took the coons and sold the pelts. Selling without a license is an offence for which the minimum penalty is \$25 and costs. The fine was imposed on Cook.
The destruction of a raccoon's den is an offence for which the minimum penalty is \$5 and costs which was imposed on Miller. Both men declared they were ignorant of the law and had no intention of doing illegal acts.
Donald McDonald, Deputy Minister of Game and Fisheries, stated to the Globe last night that, under Subsection 5, section 11 of the act, a farmer was allowed to kill any animal which was destroying his property.
"As to disposing of the pelts," said Mr. McDonald. "If the department is notified a permit to sell will be issued gratis to the farmer when the animal has been killed as a nuisance."

Milton Women's Institute
The directors of Halton Women's Institute met at Milton on Friday and decided to hold the annual meeting at Burlington on June 1st. Mrs. Merry, secretary of the Institute, was presented with a silver pyrex dish and a meat fork by Mrs. Claridge, of Acton, on behalf of the branches of the district. Mrs. Atkinson, of Palermo, read the address.

At the annual At Home of the Milton Athletic Club, held in the town hall Milton last week, each member of the club's O.H.A. intermediate team, winners of the championship of the Halton County Intermediate Hockey League and the Harris cup, and the O.H.A. junior team was presented with a handsome sweater coat in the red and white colors of the club. The presentation was made by A. L. Chambers, Vice-President of the club, who congratulated both teams on their splendid showing made in their respective O.H.A. groups, W.M.A.

Halton Rifles Reg't

Plans for the coming year's work were matured at the Annual Meeting of the officers of the Halton Rifles Regiment held at Georgetown in January. It was announced that the regimental training would take on a new form, in accordance with the instructions received from district headquarters. In future, training will take place at local company armories, as in the case of the city regiments. The whole militia program will not be as former years but entirely focussed upon a summer training camp. Camps will still be held probably at Long Branch ranges or at some place in the country that can be easily reached but they will normally be of only a few days duration and will be restricted to soldiers who have received training. It is now recognized that the two weeks summer camp of pre-war days is impracticable for the majority of young men in steady positions, and that more training will be accomplished by establishing local centres in the various towns of the country, which will be meeting places for the members of the regiment during the whole year.
The Halton Rifles are now brigaded with the Peel, York, and Ontario Regiments in the 25th Infantry Brigade. A competitive tactical exercise in which the Halton officers will match their skill against the Peels is to take place about the end of the month, the scheme being played out on two evenings, one in the Peel area and the other in the Halton area. The annual brigade staff ride, which attracts officers from all our four regiments, is planned for the month of October, and will be this year in the neighborhood of Brantford. The exercise took place at Georgetown last year, and at Uxbridge in 1923. These Staff Rides gain in popularity every year, affording as they do an opportunity for the officers of the various regiments to get to know one another better. It is expected that the brigade, which has already on more than one occasion shown that it stands second to none as a fighting unit, will challenge a Western Ontario brigade during the coming year. The exercise will be held to be held in some rural area. It looks like a busy year for the Haltons.
The company officers have been instructed to see that sergeants' messes are set up in the company armories, and that everything possible is done to make the training efficient and interesting. Drills are to be of minimum length and the bulk of the instruction will be technical in nature, dealing with army organization and maintenance, and the care and use of the most modern weapons, and up-to-date tactical methods.
"D" Company will start training on Monday evening April 20th at 7:30 p.m. and will complete six nights training before camp. The camp this year will likely be at Long Branch Ranges from July 1 to 4. It will be chiefly musketry and Lewis Gun training under the supervision of Major F. W. Utton, O.B.E. district weapon training officer for M.D. 2.
In the early autumn it is proposed to hold a Field Day in connection with the Annual Inspection by the G.O.C., M.D. 2 - C. J. Cummings, Capt. O.C. "D" company Halton Rifles.

New Style of Electric Car
A new type of electric car, the latest word in radial equipment, has been placed on the line of the Canadian National Railway between Toronto and Guelph. The new style of car has manifestly been designed for comfort and safety. It has roller bearings, improved seats, double windows, filtered water and a telephone, by which the crew can connect promptly with agents, power or dispatcher. The addition of this new car will in no way interfere with the present service given, but is merely to give additional comfort and accommodation. The motor in this new style electric car is capable of hauling five regular passenger coaches, and can maintain a high rate of speed.

The Beautification of Rural School Grounds
The Canadian Horticultural Council have earned the gratitude of every public spirited citizen in fostering the ornamental planting of the school grounds throughout the country. Commencing last year ten silver cups were offered for competition in various districts of the Dominion to the rural schools accomplishing the greatest degree of beautification of the grounds during the year. Most of these cups were won last season, but they cannot become the property of any school until won three times, not necessarily in succession. With the winning of each cup goes an Award of Merit Certificate that may be framed and kept by the school as a permanent record.
Mr. L. F. Burrows, secretary of the Horticultural Council at Ottawa, announces that the number of entries being received promised keen competition this year. With each entry a photograph of the grounds should be supplied, to be compared with a similar picture taken in the autumn showing the improvement that has been made. Trustee boards, Women's Institutes and Horticultural Societies are urged to cooperate with the Council, which will provide instructions and suggestions on the plants that may be used and their arrangement to the school grounds.
