Obituary
MRS. THOMAS T. MOORE
Full of ripened years, and with a career remarkable for a life of industry and loving helpful service, Mrs. Thomas T. Moore peacefully entered into rest at the home of her daughter, Mrs. H. C. Schreiber, Kitchener, on Friday afternoon, for only a week Mrs. Moore was confined to her bed. She fell asleep in her eighty-fifth year. Mrs. Moore, whose maiden name was Sarah Ross, was a daughter of the late John Ross, and was born in King Township, York County, fifty-five years ago. She was married to Thomas T. Moore, a successful school teacher, who was a native of Finlona, County Tyrone, Ireland, and came to Canada when a lad. In 1879 Mr. Moore was engaged as principal of Acton schools and for twenty-five years continued in that position with marked success. He professed Mrs. Moore eighteen years ago. For forty years the family resided in Acton and enjoyed the esteem and cordial fellowship of the community. Three sons and three daughters blessed the union of this worthy couple. The two elder sons have passed away: T. James, when city manager of Guelph, six years ago, and William John, as a veteran of the South African War in 1900. He died in Pretoria, and the monument to his memory erected by the citizens of Acton, stands at the entrance to Fairview Cemetery. The surviving members of the family are: Mrs. H. P. McKerrin, Toronto; Mr. J. M. Moore, editor and publisher of the Georgetown Herald; Mrs. Charles Jenner, a widowed daughter, and Mrs. Herbert C. Schreiber, Kitchener, all of whom were at her bedside during her last hours. Mrs. Moore was for over forty years a member of the Methodist Church here, and was always interested in its activities. She was a wonderful mother and was always concerned in the welfare of her sons and daughters. "This mother's heart had many charms, And love was written on her arms. And in her eyes a faith divine, For Home was You, O mother mine!" For some time she had been residing with her daughter, Mrs. Schreiber, though she made prolonged visits at the homes of Mrs. J. M. Moore, Georgetown, and Mrs. McKerrin, Toronto. A motor funeral was held from Kitchener on Monday, and a memorial service took place in the United Church at three o'clock in the afternoon. Rev. George W. Barker, Toronto; Rev. Mr. Zimmerman, the Pastor; Rev. Mr. McLennan, Kitchener, and Rev. Dr. Dickie, of Georgetown, conducted the service. The body was laid to rest beside that of her beloved husband in the family plot in Fairview Cemetery. The bearers were: Messrs. A. E. Nicklin, J. P. H. P. Moore, P. M. John R. Kennedy, A. T. Georgetown, May 7th.
Council met at 8 p.m. with Devoe McIntyre in the chair and Councilors Ashenburt, Barclay, Campbell, Dunnean, Kelly and Long present.
Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.
Communications were read from Wilson, Hurrell & Georgetown real estate agents; Board of Railways Commissioners for Canada, Speight, Battery Service & Garage, Bailey Bros., Secretary Public School Board, Ontario Bookbinding Office, Massey-Harris Co., The Dow Chemical Co., Walter Chipman, George H. Power, John Mackin, E. McCannab and Francis, Hoskins & Co.

Messrs. Brown and Clark addressed the Council to outsiders selling bread in town without a license.
Mr. Scrymgeour addressed the Council re getting Reservoir Park for football and asking for a small grant.
Mr. Ed. McWhirter addressed the Council asking for a grant to aid the Arena Co. to put on a field day on the 1st of July.
Moved by Kelly, seconded by Barclay, that the Georgetown Football Club be given a grant of \$25 for 1926.—Carried.

Moved by Ashenburt, seconded by Campbell, that the Arena Co. be given a grant of \$100 to aid them for expenses for a field day on the 1st of July and that they be granted the use of the park for that day for a rental of \$1.00 and they be granted use of chairs and piano at usual rental.—Carried.
Moved by Long, seconded by Dunnean, that the Clerk be instructed to write the Railway Commissioners of Canada in answer to report that this Council cannot consider the expense of widening on John Street.—Carried.
Moved by Ashenburt, seconded by Dunnean, that the Clerk be instructed to order from Arthur R. Speight a 18 plate battery at \$20, as per his tender.—Carried.
Moved by Campbell, seconded by Kelly, that Henry Marchant be appointed Town Constable, pro tem, during Chief Jackson's illness and that Mayor Dale be instructed to take the necessary steps to have him sworn in office.—Carried.
Moved by Long, seconded by Kelly, that the L. C. U. C. Classes of the United Church be granted the use of the park for a garden party on June 3rd, 1926.—Carried.

Moved by Barclay, seconded by Ashenburt, that this Council acknowledge with thanks a cheque of \$4.12 to be used in helping install a fire alarm system in Georgetown.—Carried.
Moved by Long, seconded by Barclay, that the Clerk be instructed to appeal the assessment on waterworks property at Silver Creek as being too high.—Carried.

Limehouse

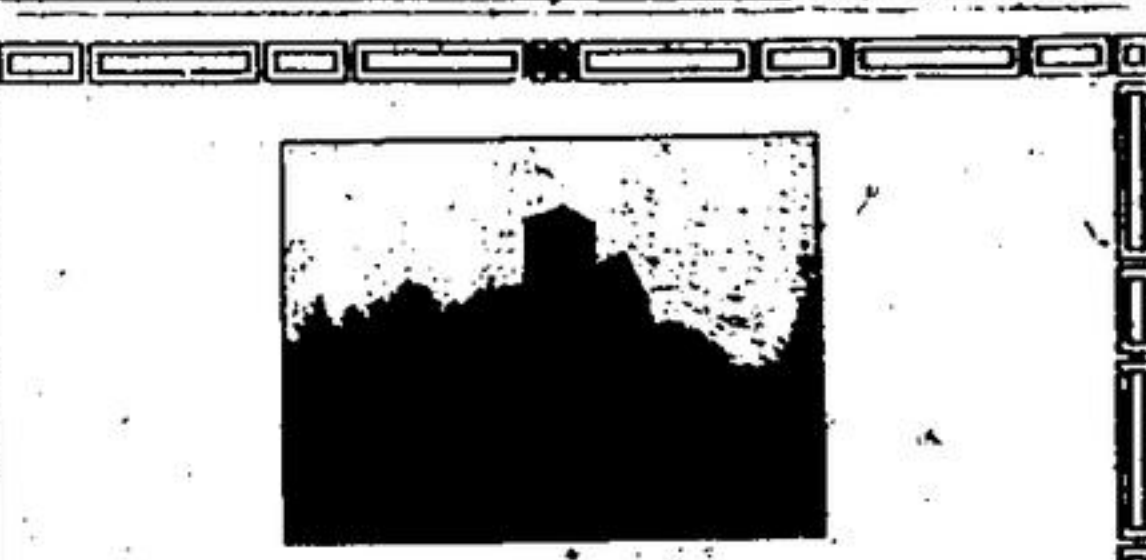
Mrs. Robert Doughty our esteemed citizen, was the recipient of a presentation and the following address which speaks for itself.

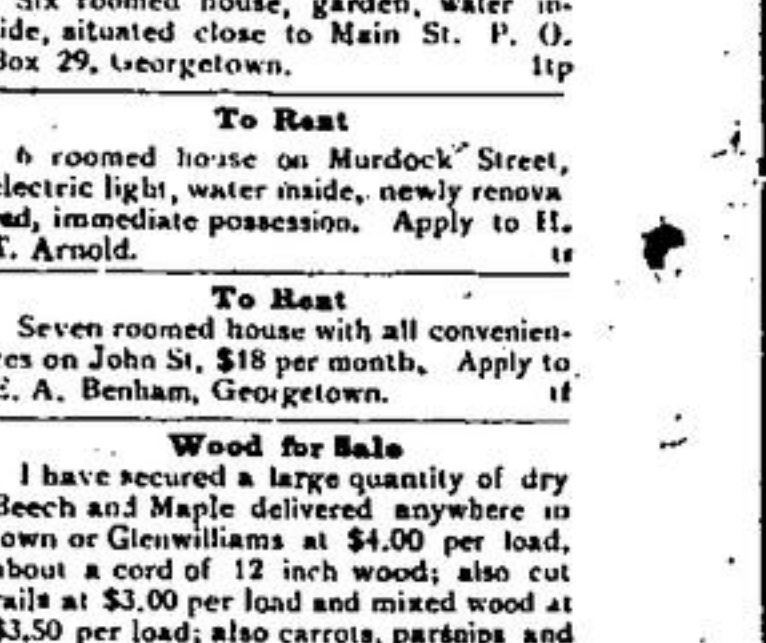
