Addresses To The Women
A special meeting of the Local Council of Women at which all the Women's organizations of the town and vicinity were represented, was held in the Public Library last Friday afternoon. Two speakers from Toronto, Mrs. R. S. Smythe and Mrs. Northover, President and Cor. Secretary of the Ontario Provincial Council of women gave most interesting addresses on subjects which are engaging the attention of the women of to day. Mrs. Smythe outlined the problems that the women of Ontario must face, the most important being prohibition. The women of Ontario are 54% of the voters and if they will use their franchise and poll a one hundred percent vote, they hold the balance of power. Another problem is the care of the feeble-minded which are such a menace to the morals of our country. Since 1906 the Provincial Council has petitioned the Government every year to provide farms where these morons could be segregated and taught manual work under supervision. The present system sends them to the Public School until they are sixteen, then turns them out on the world. Other subjects discussed were our naturalization laws which allow foreigners to take their papers home to be fitted in by others, while they themselves can not speak English; our marriage laws which appear very antiquated compared with the Swedish marriage laws which are the best and most progressive in the world.
