Two Fire Calls Saturday

About 14 o'clock Saturday morning the firemen were called out to extinguish a blaze which threatened to destroy some out buildings in the rear of Mr. Fred Brook's block on Main St. No damage was done.
On Saturday evening shortly after 10 o'clock, the large paper warehouse on the Credit, was discovered to be on fire and the firemen responded promptly to the alarm. The building, a frame structure, was a sheet of flames when discovered and nothing could be done but save the surrounding buildings. About 300 tons of paper stock stored in the shed was completely destroyed and the loss will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000. This is partly covered by insurance.
