Peel Progressives

Selected J. W. Taylor
H. J. W. Taylor, well-known Chinguacousy farmer, received the Progressive nomination for the Legislature for Peel County at the third party's convention in the Posters Hall, Brampton, last Friday afternoon.
Barnes had been rife that Hon. W. E. Roney M.P.P., Progressive Leader, was willing to accept the nomination and accordingly, he was named at the meeting, 116 of the 125 delegates present voting for him. The nomination did not remain, however, as Roney of Toronto announced that he was at the convention as Mr. Roney's representative, and speaking for the Leader, would decline the honor. Several others were nominated and all withdrew in favor of Mr. Taylor.
Mr. Taylor has been prominent for some time as a member of the various farmer clubs. In the Federal election of 1921 he carried the Progressive banner against both Liberal and Conservative candidates. The Conservative candidate, S. C. Charters, who is the present Dominion member, was victorious, but Mr. Taylor was credited with a good run. Mr. Taylor is a member of the United Church, and resides at Shelburne.

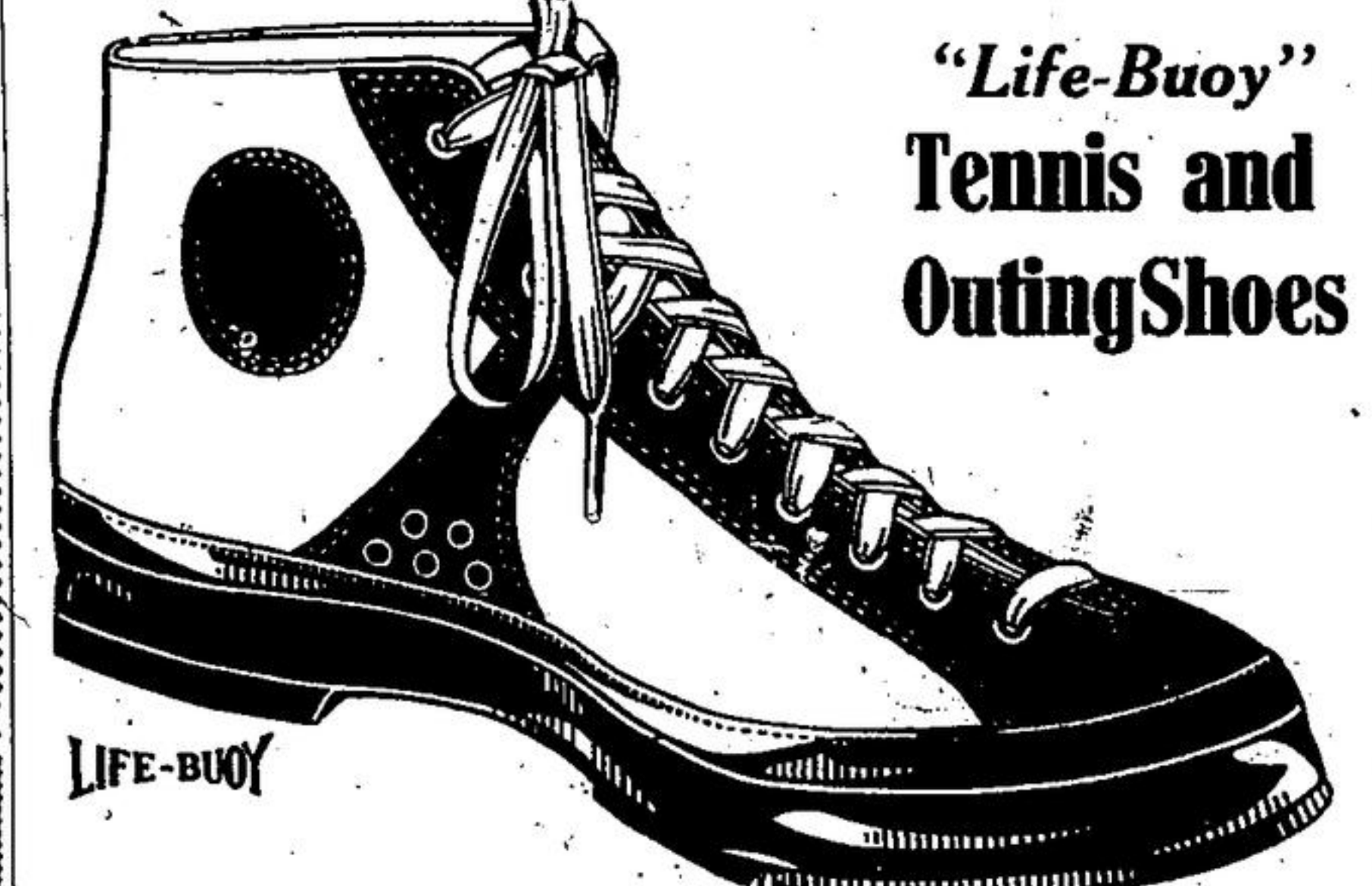
