Safety First at Crossings

A good many motorists fail to realize that the Highway Traffic Act means what it says when it enacted this clause "No motor vehicle shall be driven at a street intersection at a greater rate of speed than is shown by a sign in a town or village. The penalty for first offence is not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$10.00 and for second or subsequent offence not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00 and the license may be suspended for any period not exceeding three months."

May Business Summary

In Ontario cool weather retarded growth of pastures, and seeding while well advanced, is about ten days to two weeks behind the average. Fall wheat is spotty and considerably average will require to be sown. There is good demand for heavy horses. Wholesale houses report sales in satisfactory volume. Retail merchants have experienced a quiet month, but some improvement has been noticeable during the past week. Industry in the manufacturing line continues to show improvement. Shipyards are busily engaged on repair work and the iron and steel industries are active. Agricultural implement manufacturers report a good domestic demand. Due to the recent change in the tariff on automobiles, the outlook in the motor car industry is uncertain. Sales of cars this Spring are in large volume. Packing houses are well employed and flour mills are operating on a moderate basis.—Bank of Montreal.

Lady Byng Inspired by Rockies

No one has any right to speak with authority of Canada who has seen only the East or the West. It was Her Excellency, Lady Byng of Vimy who made this statement recently at a luncheon of the Ottawa Women's Canadian Club shortly after her return from a trip across and through Canada over a matter of some eighty thousand miles. Accompanying Her Excellency the Governor General, Lady Byng had visited practically all parts of Canada moving at every stopping place the warm welcome Canadians everywhere reserve for "Byng of Vimy" and his charming Lady and not less important, becoming acquainted with Canada's unrivalled and never-ending succession of scenic beauties.

"I feel I have some plea to come to speak to you on Canada," said Her Excellency, "I come as a sort of advertising agent to beg of you that you go west and visit there. I know the terrible question of expense but

pathetic study of cause and effect will solve the difficulties which confront the country as a whole. Books and newspapers assist somewhat in bringing into closer touch the eastern, central and western regions of the Dominion: But not until the people living east visit the west and the people in the west visit the older provinces — visit them with the intention of becoming acquainted with the life and ideals of the native born, will any degree of intimacy or understanding be reached.

The lesson of Lady Byng's speech, then, is for Canadians, when they go travelling on holiday, to extend their knowledge of the structure and economic life of the people in other parts of the country than their own and to see for themselves the beauty of Canadian scenery which travellers from other lands say is unequalled the world over and of which every province has its full share — see Canada first, and see it from Halifax to Victoria.

The opinion of Her Excellency regarding Western Canada is not that of a mere passerby. With the Governor-General she has been all over the country, going by motor where the rail and river do not penetrate. "There are those," said Lady Byng, "who visit Canada landing at Quebec, coming on to Montreal, proceeding to Ottawa, and Toronto, who have gone away giving their view on Canada. Such views are always defective even if sometimes they are not wholly unfair and unjust. Canada's greatness is evident on the map, but its actual size is only realized through direct contact and acquaintance."

The loss of interchanging visits east and west is developing the attitude so admirably taken by the wife of the Governor-General should speed the movement and give it wider impetus.

In our Dominion different localities have different interests and problems, and nothing but a close and sym-

A world-weary "Old Timer," one of the pioneers of the Canadian West, died recently in Edmonton at the age of 94. He was known as "Daddy" Blair, but his real name was Telesphore Alexander Blair. As a scout, soldier and adventurer he carried the Hudson's Bay Company flag into the remote corners of the West for half a century, finally bowing his sturdy shoulders before the ravages of age. Since the inauguration of stampedes in various cities in the West, Daddy was always one of the first to attend, no matter how much he felt the weight of his years. He made his last effort in 1920 when he attended the Hudson's Bay Parade in Edmonton at the age of 89.

Dad was only fourteen years of age when he left the old homestead near Montreal. The glamour, the excitement, the rush and uncertainty of circus life, the shouts of the performers, the tumultuous applause of happy pleasure-seekers, lured him. Even the dust bit into his blood and away went Dad, around the world with Barnum's circus.

One day in London, Daddy was driving one of Barnum's eight-horse teams. A little girl ran suddenly into the street. There was a shout, a shriek from one of the spectators, and before anyone knew what was happening Daddy had wrenched the ponies almost completely around, saving the child's life by about two inches. In the mix-up Daddy fell into the muddy street, ruining his clothes. Her Majesty Queen Victoria, who happened to witness the scene, called the next day, shook hands with Daddy and had a suit of clothes sent to him.

Blair started for the Northwest in 1852, walking to Fort Garry. When the Canadian Pacific Railway was building into Winnipeg he wanted adventure, went up and down the country. He served as a scout for General Strange; he was attached to the service of Lord Strathcona, then Donald Smith of the C. P. R.; he carried mail for the Hudson's Bay Company over the Crow's Nest Trail; and he narrowly escaped being burned to death by Indians. Daddy got the adventure he had thought he wanted and he died more satisfied than many another man would have been.
