The church parade to Knox Presbyterian Church was largely attended and an eloquent and inspiring sermon was delivered by Rev. Kenneth MacLean, who chose as his text, "A three-fold cord is not quickly broken."—Ecc. 4:12.

"Before proceeding to the consideration of the subject suggested by these words I wish to speak a word of welcome to the members of Orion Lodge and Verduin Rebekah Lodge and visitors from neighboring lodges who worship with us this evening. We welcome you to this house of worship recognizing that many of you have this evening left your own church in order to meet with us tonight."

The three links are understood to be the symbol of our fraternity and while it may be difficult to find that exact expression in the volume of the Standard Law, the expression in our text, "a three-fold cord," is at least similar in meaning. The three virtues thus symbolized are Friendship, Love and Truth.

A large measure of friendship is the great need of today. Those who ought to establish the League of Nations did so for the purpose of establishing friendship among the nations of the world, and by friendly intercourse to arrive at decisions which would be just. The recent meeting of the Prime Ministers of the English and Canadian did so for the same purpose.

Another aim is the establishing of better relations. Almost every city or town or village in Canada today feels the need of more friendly intercourse among the various sections of its population. Some few have given full expression to the desire for friendship. The young physician who gives up home and comfort to minister to the needs of a leper colony expresses his friendship in deeds. The young missionary to the dark continents of the world shows his friendship by his interest in the neglected millions. The young man who objects to excessive child labor and who establishes the juvenile court proves that friendship and not the hope of material reward is the passion that moves him.

The second link in the chain or the second strand in the cord is that of Love. It is closely related to Friendship and the culmination of it. "Love is approbation of and inclination towards an object that appears to us as good." It expresses the relationship that ought to exist between man and God, and between us and our fellow-men. We are to love God with all our powers, working to the highest degree, and we are to love our neighbor as ourselves. The Mosaic Law provides for this love. Men were not to glean the corners of the field but were to leave them for the poor. Men were not to gather the fallen fruit but were to leave it for the poor. The legitimate love of self is the desire we should have to fulfill our lives in accordance with the plans of God. Our love for our neighbor is not in the desire to cooperate with Him to the fulfillment of His plan for him. We immediately recognize that without love in the heart our lives are barren. It may be a law of society that we are not to recognize our neighbor until he is formally introduced, but it is a higher law, a law of God, that we shall love our neighbor, and love is sure to find some means of expression, some method of greeting.

The third link or strand is Truth. Truth is accuracy in perception and accurate, in expression. The Old Testament word of the truth was in its relationship to God. It refers to what is revealed or known about God. Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life. He was the Truth about God. We give expression to the truth by action when we pray, labour, refreshment and sleep.

The comment of our text upon this cord is that it is not quickly broken. Show me the man in whose heart is friendship to mankind, love to God and neighbor, and the expression of whose life is truth; and I can then show you a man who is not likely to become despondent in the time of disappointment nor undecided in the hour of success. He will be calm and persevering and he need not fear what the reward of life will be for him.

These three divine qualities which brought you to the Oldfellow fraternity seek to inculcate to an eminent degree.

On returning to the lodge rooms hearty votes of thanks was tendered Rev. Mr. MacLean, the choir, Mrs. Henderson and Mr. Lebrun for their co-operation in making this a memorable event in the history of these lodges.
