The annual summer meeting of the W.M.S. of Mount Pleasant United Church was held at the home of President, Mrs. J. O. McMeekin, last week with a large attendance, which included representatives from Norval, Home church, Huttonville, Cheltenham and Brampton.

Lord Willingdon has been appointed governor-general of Canada to succeed Lord Bynoe of Vimy who has held the post since 1921. It was officially announced at London on Tuesday. Lord Willingdon of Raton is in China putting the finishing touches on his recommendation to the British government, and through the Chinese government, to the administration of the millions of pounds of indemnity left over from the Boxer rebellion. He has been at Peking for some time on a state mission helping on behalf of his government, to straighten out the situation concerning the indemnities. Lord Willingdon will return to London on June 19th.
