L. T. B. 393, Georgetown, and L. O. L. 346 Glenwilliams Capture Prizes

The celebration of the Glorious Twelfth in Milton on Monday, in which 2,500 loyal Orangemen, representing 58 lodges, marched in the honor parade in the history of any Orange celebration in Milton or Halton County, was favored with King's weather. Proceedings started in a procession which left Victoria Park at 1.30 p. m., and proceeded to the air grounds, where a full athletic program was carried out. As usual there was no lack of bands, prominent being the L. O. O. F. brass band of Preston, Verdun O. Y. B. 340, file and drum band of Preston, Guelph citizens' pipe band, L. O. L. 133 I, Guelph file and drum band, Milton brass band, St. Angelo Highlanders' band of Hamilton, and Stewarttown, Georgetown, Glenwilliams and Acton file and drum bands. Prior to the march, Mayor Irving of Milton delivered an address of welcome to the visiting lodges, after which the procession lined up and marched, headed by County Marshal W. McCready, of Milton.

In the procession prize—L. T. B. 393, Georgetown won the best lodge's marching lodge, and L. O. L. 346 Glenwilliams had the best file and drum band in the parade.

When Banff is reached the train stops to allow passengers to see the Banff Springs Hotel and the beautiful Bow Valley. Westward it speeds through the Canadian Pacific Rockies, some 800 feet long, the tallest towering 74 feet high and built of sheet iron and plaster, and dashes into Connaught tunnel, thence on to the Coast, where one sees Vancouver Harbour, the Straits of Georgia and picturesque Victoria.

More than half a million people rode on the little Canadian Pacific Railway at Wembley last year, and among its distinguished passengers were the King and Queen and the Duke and Duchess of York.
