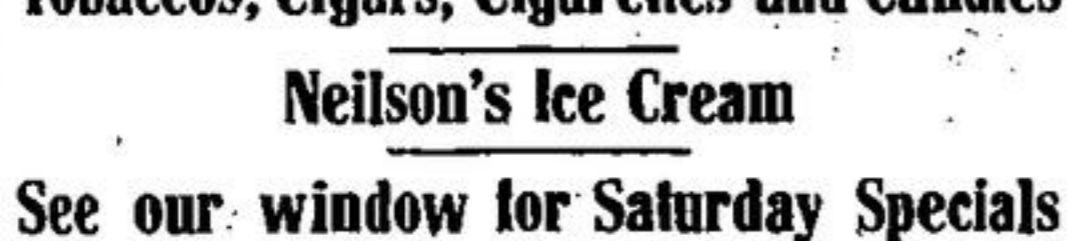

Sir James Craig Expected at Brampton.

Officials of the Royal Black Knights of Ireland expect James Craig, Premier of Ulster, will be here for August 15th, when thousands of Toronto dignitaries will go to Brampton to celebrate the "Relief of Derry."

The Equalization—Wednesday morning the Reeves, Deputy Reeves and Clerks of the Halton municipalities appeared before Judge Elliot at his chambers, having been asked to do so by him to fix the date for the first hearing of the appeal of the township of Esqueping against the recent equalization of the assessment by the county council. Le Roy Duff was counsel for the appellant municipality. The respondents were represented by Crown Attorney Dick, County Solicitor, Burlington, by Hughes-Cleaver, Oakville, W. D. Gregory, Pa. The respondents it was argued that the onus was on the appellants to justify their appeal. His Honor did not agree with this. He said he would, on the contrary, take each municipality separately and require its representatives to show that it had been correctly assessed. He said he was ready to proceed without delay, but none of the municipalities were ready. He fixed Aug. 24th as the date of the first hearing that of Esqueping, and Aug. 27th for that of Milton. Other dates will be named in due course.

Convicted Quashed—Last Friday Judge Elliot quashed the conviction by Police Magistrate Moore on April 15th, of Cecil Eddy, of the Village Inn, Campbellville. At the trial License Inspector Reevly produced two ounces of liquor which he swore was about half of what had been collected from three bottles at the inn. He had indicated it to the other half to Toronto, where it had been analyzed and found to be alcoholic. His Honor said such a method of getting evidence was wrong, as mixing might produce chemical action.

NOVAL STATION OFFICIALLY CLOSED.

News received with general regret in this district is that of the closing of Noval station, which has been in existence almost as long as the C.N.R.

When the Old Grand Trunk, with its wonderful bell smokestacks, and its wee locomotives, was laid through the centre of Peel County, Toronto station, though a mile and more from the village, played a wonderful part in the development of the surrounding country. For one thing in particular, it was the nucleus around which for many years centred the grain and flour business of the Village. Six teams were on the road conveying grain to the Noval Mills, and carrying flour back for shipment all over Canada.

The coming of the radial and the development, and the running of a spur into the mill yard has changed those things, and the glory of Noval station is sadly dimmed. The farmers for many miles around will miss the old station. Here were shipped thousands of cans of milk and crates of fruit, and the station guarded many a load of merchandise intended for consumption in the great farming territory around.

But Noval station is no more. On Monday it was officially closed, and henceforth, those wishing to board a train at this point, must flag the train to stop to allow passengers to descend, but the old days of the cosy waiting room and genial get-together of men and women waiting for trains, of awaiting passengers, are ended.

In 1882 George Jackson took up his residence at the little station, where for 25 years he attended faithfully to the business of the station and served the C.N.R. with much appreciated loyalty. He was succeeded by his son, Herbert Jackson, and for 15 years the latter has "carried on" in the place of his father, with the same characteristics equally marked.

Forty years' residence in one place creates ties of friendship and neighbourliness which are not snapped at a moment's notice, and it was only when the community realized that Herb Jackson would be gone from Noval in three days' time that they were so keenly interested in the fact that Noval station would be closed.

Credit Masonic Lodge, Georgetown, with which Mr. Jackson has been connected for many years, was the first group to come to say good-bye and God speed. On Monday evening a large party of the members of this lodge, accompanied by some of the Acton brethren, and the evening with music and speech-making. Those who took part in this end of the affair were Betty Arnold, J. B. Wallace, Grant, J. T. Cameron, Mrs. Brown, Messrs. Lacey, Murray, Wilson, Fallis, Saunders, Dobson. Mr. Wallace then presented Jackson on behalf of the lodge, with an onyx pencil and a fountain pen, and Mr. Grant gave Mrs. Jackson a magnificent bouquet of hot-house flowers. Supper and a musical program followed.

On Tuesday evening Mr. and Mrs. Jackson and Mrs. Jackson, Sr., were summoned to the home of Mr. John Cameron, when they were surprised by a gathering of 300 people from every section of the surrounding country and the village of Noval.

The expression of the hearty congratulations and a splendid program of readings and music was given by Mrs. Frank Hunter, Mrs. C. McLaughlin, Misses M. Russell, R. Anderson, Dorothy Watson, Margaret McDonald, Margaret McKeen and Messrs. L. F. Greenwood, Wilfred and Roy Lewis.

Addresses of appreciation for the Jackson family and of regret at their departure were made by Reeve W. Little, Chingocousy; J. L. Clark, Noval; Ed. Greenwood, Col. A. Noble, Toronto; Rev. N. D. Kinnison, Noval. An address was read by H. A. Dolson, as follows, and on the conclusion of the address, Edward Greenwood, on behalf of the community, presented Mr. and Mrs. Jackson with a beautiful silver tea-service.
