Killed on Track

Italian Near Milton Falls or Throws Himself Before Engine

A fatal accident occurred about five miles west of Milton at five o'clock Saturday afternoon, when an ungarried Italian Luigi Sertori, aged 25 years, of Hespeler, formerly of Christie, was killed on the C.P.R. trucks.

Sertori, who was employed at the lime kilns at Hespeler, was on his way to visit friends at Christie, four miles west of Milton. Getting off the eastbound passenger train at Geuph started to walk east on the track toward Christie, although the train stops regularly at his destination. He had only walked a short distance when, as the fireman of the engine and other eye witnesses state, he either slipped or deliberately threw himself on the track in front of the engine, which killed him instantly. An inquest was opened by Dr. H. McCall, coroner of Milton, and adjourned to Thursday next, at 7:30 p.m.

In one of Sertori's pockets was found a list of names of Italians and others who had subscribed to a fund to help the family of the late P. Zocca who committed suicide a few weeks ago by firing his head off with a revolver at his home at Christie. Both Zocca and Sertori had been taking trips to Toronto to take treatments from a specialist, and it was suggested at the inquest yesterday that they be summoned to attend the adjourned inquest as it is generally believed that Sertori committed suicide. The object of asking the specialist to appear at the inquest is to ascertain what the Italians were suffering from.

Sad Accident at Huttonville Park

John Costes of Toronto Loses Life in Credit River

While swimming in the Credit River at Huttonville Park, five miles east of here, John Costes, aged 22 years, of Parkmount Road, Toronto, was drowned shortly after 1 o'clock Sunday. The body was not recovered until five hours later.

The young man had motored out to the park with a party of Toronto people. Almost immediately after having lunch, he entered the water and had not waded far into the river when he disappeared. At the point at which he was last seen alive, the water was not more than four feet deep. Costes was not a very good swimmer, his friends said.

The body was recovered near the power dam, a short distance away from the scene of the drowning. After several fruitless hours of search the water behind the dam was lowered and the body uncovered, and removed by Brampton. Funeral Services. No inquest will be held.
