**Obituary**  
William Hingham  
The funeral of the late William Hingham took place from his late residence, George St., Georgetown on July 28th. After a private service in the home the cortege proceeded to the United Church, Georgetown, where the service was conducted by W. H. Henry Caldwell.

The singing was led by the choir and included a set of "One Sweetly Solemn Thought" and a solo "That City Thouquar" which were sweetly rendered. Leaving the church the cortege proceeded to Coningsby Cemetery where interment was made on the hill overlooking the old Hingham home.

The deceased was born June 20th, 1853 at Churchville. While still a child he moved with his father, mother and the rest of the family to Coningsby, Erin township. On Nov. 2nd, 1881 he was married to Hannah Bennett, daughter of the late Thomas Bennett of Erin Township by the Rev. Geo. Clark M.E. then stationed at Georgetown.

The issue of the marriage was four sons and three daughters, five of which are living: Robert L. of Calgary, Thomas E. at home, Hattie of Mexico, Mary A. of Saskatchewan and Alma. From the year 1900 he resided in Caledon, Ospringe, Speerside, Fergus, Alma, coming to Georgetown early in the year 1919 when he has since resided.

The late Wm. Hingham was a man of earnest Christian character, always ready to lend a helping hand to his fellowmen, unflinching in his convictions, looking forward to his death with a peculiar contented anticipation.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful, including wreaths from his neighbors, relatives at Sault Ste. Marie, Georgetown, Acton, Erin, Georgetown, and Erin; sprays from nieces and also friends in Georgetown and a pillow from the family.

The pallbearers were old friends of the deceased, Alex and John McKinney, Alex McKinnon, John Allen, Percy Cleaves and Martin Near.

On Wednesday evening they passed peacefully to rest George C. Campbell after four week's struggle between life and death the result of an accident, when he fell from the larn of John Barnes, eighth line, Esquesing, where he was shingling. He was immediately taken to Wellaley Hospital Toronto, and after spending three weeks under the care of Dr. A. McNeil and other skillful hands, he was removed to his home in Georgetown where every possible comfort was given him but without avail.

He was born August 1st, 1869 on the Campbell homestead, lot 30, seventh line, Esquesing. He was a son of the late George and Annie Campbell. On Jan. 16th, 1901, he married Ada E. Johnston of Acton. One child was born to them Luena M. They resided on the farm till seven years ago when they removed to Georgetown where the family now reside.

He was an active member of the town council, an enthusiastic member of the curling club. He was an active member of the United Church where he was one of the Stewards. Also a member of the Bible Class. His present pastor Rev. Dr. Dickie and a former pastor Rev. Mr. Caldwell officiated at the funeral which was held on Saturday afternoon at the family residence, George St.

The pallbearers were Messrs. John Barnes, Martin Near, William Short, John Miller, David Cook, George Rennie.

The floral tributes were numerous and beautiful. The funeral service was largely attended and interment was made in the family plot, Fairview Cemetery, Acton. He is survived by his sorrowing widow and daughter, one brother, Harry Campbell, of Toronto, two sisters, Mrs. E. F. Collier, Mrs. J. E. Gamble, Acton.

**The Halton Rifles**  
Held Successful 3-day Camp at Long Branch

The County Regiment was successful in reaching its objective of 150 officers and men at the Annual Musketry Camp of the 25th Infantry Brigade held last week-end at the camp which was favored with fine weather and the entire musketry programme was completed as well as the programme of sports arranged for, and the annual inspection of the Regiment by Brigadier General A. H. Bell, C.M.G., D.S.O., District Officer Commanding M.D. 2. For the first time in the history of the Rural Militia of Canada the Halton Rifles demonstrated rifle drill on inspection and the Officers were complimented by the Brigade and District Staff on the fine showing of the Regiment.

The turn out was the largest since 1922, and the Halton Rifles were the largest unit in camp. Major J. H. Podley M.C. was in command. For the first time since the war the Brigade mounted a guard mount of the Guard Mounting was watched with interest by a large assembly of visitors to the Ranges, many of them veterans of the Great War. The Battalion Band took the Church service on Sunday morning and the Brigade Band played the Regiment by an inspection.

In the sports competition which was won by the Ontario Regiment; the Halton Rifles won 21 points, winning the standing broad jump and taking 2nd place in five other events. The Post Regiment won the tug-of-war event and the Ontario Regiment took the soft ball event defeating the Halton team by 18-15. The Ontario Regiment won the Brigade Silver Cup for Musketry. The result of the shooting for the Lachlan Grant Musketry Trophy will be announced later.

At the conclusion of camp 6 officers left for Niagara Camp to qualify for higher rank. The Brigade expects to obtain authorization for a seven day camp next year and to undertake tactical training in addition to musketry.

**Volunteer Firemen's Annual Convention**

Clear, though humid weather served to make a wonderful success of the closing day of the annual convention of the Ontario Volunteer Firemen's Association, when several hundred of the volunteer fire-fighters and several thousands of their friends held a demonstration and contest in the Fair Grounds, Brampton, on Monday. A monster parade was the leading feature of the day, 750 men and 12 fire trucks of the most modern type taking part in addition to 12 bands. The most striking brigades in appearance were the United and Thorold, both appearing with frock coat, the former frocked in white cord, the latter silver. Both wore regulation white helmets, carrying their caps at their belts, and both had white gloves and shoes.

At the Fair Grounds, after the parade, these companies gave an exhibition of fancy drill, Burlington being awarded the first prize. Hamilton veterans, with their antiquated apparatus, were cheered all along the line as were the Thorold Girls' Drill Corps, carrying white and red parasols to match their uniforms.

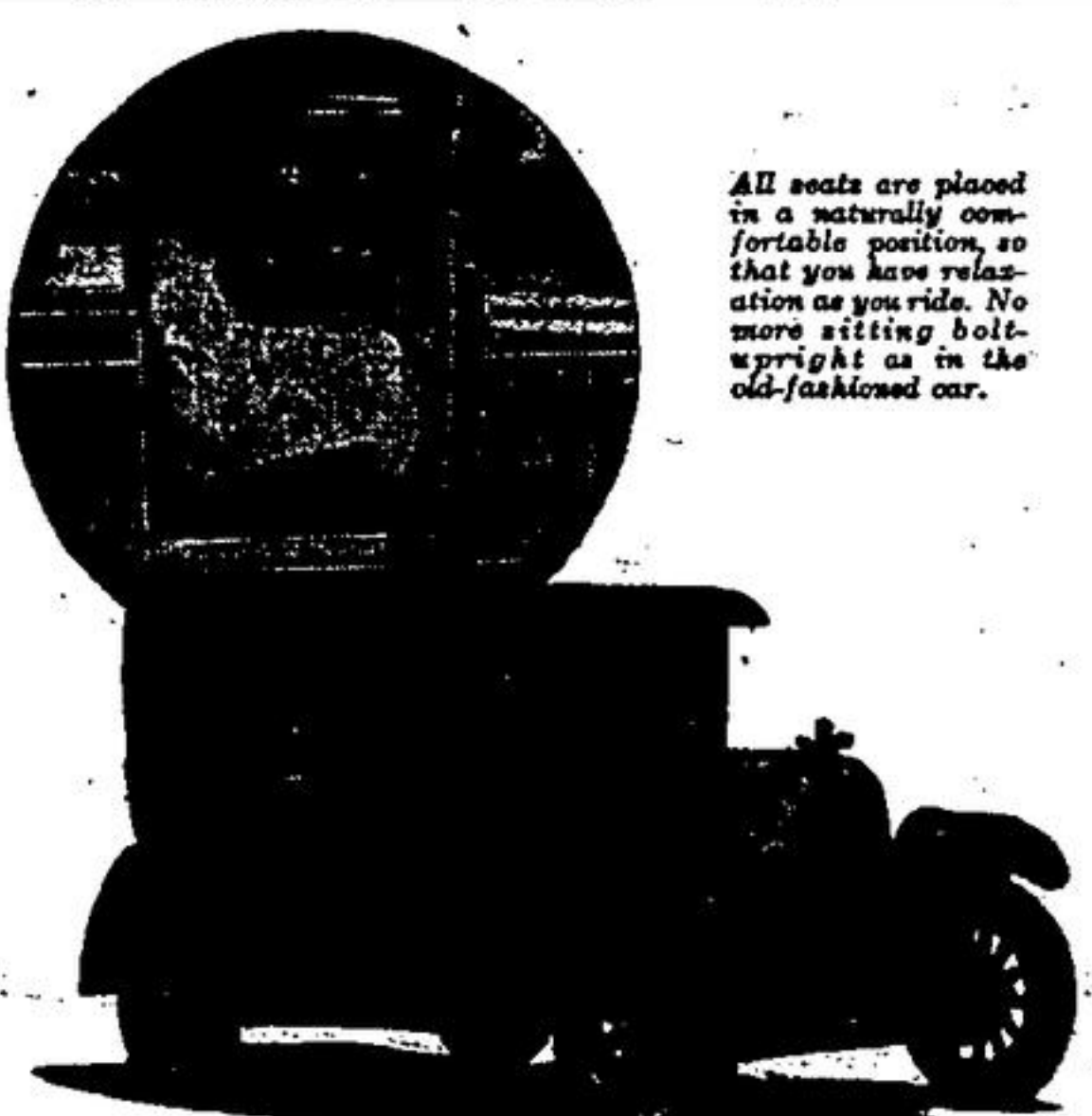

**Here and There**

A total of 850,000 trout fry from the Harff hatchery have been placed in Syllan Lake and 900,000 in Buffalo Lake, during the past week. A further contingent is to be placed in the tributary waters of the Red Deer River.

Export of pilchard oil to Europe will commence in bulk in September. Producers have contracted to ship 600 tons on each ship of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co., for several months. The market is in Rotterdam. The company will have about two ships per month. Pilchard oil is used in preparing foods and medicines.

Another step forward in the effort to restore to Montreal its leading position in the live stock industry was taken recently when members of the Eastern Cattle Market Exchange met to reorganize their operations on the basis of new changes made calculated to improve Montreal's standing in the industry.

The English football team have finished their seven weeks' tour of the Dominion and they were greatly impressed with the generous hospitality tendered to them by the people in the cities they visited. Joe Smith, captain of the team, said: "Canadian football will, in a few years, in all probability be on a par with the brand of soccer played by the major leagues in Great Britain." According to him the object of the tour has been fully accomplished.

Coming from all parts of Great Britain and Ireland twenty-five thoroughbreds were unloaded from the Canadian Pacific liner Metagans when it arrived in Montreal lately. They are for Milian's breeding and training ranch near Windsor, and comprise one stallion, 16 mares and eight geldings. Milian's Pet, 3-year-old, by Cygus (Sire of winner of Scottish Derby last year) out of La Lis; and Denton, two-year-old, who comes of the same breeding as Coronach, winner of this year's English Derby, were among the horses arriving.
