ENGLISH CHANNEL TUNNEL

Project of a Tunnel Under the Channel not in fact.

The opening of new routes in southern Kent, England, has revived the project of a tunnel under the English Channel. "That the idea is not a new one most people are aware, but few realize the great amount of thought that has been given to the plan, originally conceived more than a hundred years ago. The first person to propose the tunnel was a French engineer named Mathieu. Another, Frenchman, de Moiray, suggested submerged a series of iron tubes, an idea also put forward by Thome de Gamand, who managed to excite a good deal of interest in it. He also evinced plans for linking England and France by means of steam ferries, various kinds of bridges, and a tunnel project. His scheme for the last named having the support of the French Emperor. In the latter and sixties cross Channel projects sprang up like mushrooms. Page, the builder of Westminster Bridge, hit on the idea of building eight steel shafts at intervals across the Straits and connecting them by long tubes. Zerah Colburn, a noted engineer, proposed lighting an iron tunnel in 1,000 feet sections and sinking them in the Channel; while a plan to build a great girder bridge, supported by giant concrete pillars, over the water, was actually formed to carry the proposed proposal. Still more startling was an idea for building two immense tubes, one on each side of the Straits, by means of which passengers could be speedily projected from one country to the other.

NAMES OF CLOTH

London Tailor Wrongly Deciphered "Twirl" as "Tweed." When you order a new suit of tweed it is unlikely that either you or your tailor will be reminded that the name was accidentally bestowed on this particular kind of cloth. Most people are under the impression that it derives its name from the well-known Scottish river. The assumption is a natural one, but it is not supported by tradition. Years ago certain districts bordering the Tweed were noted for the production of a woollen cloth with a twill or twirl surface. A consignment of the fabric was despatched to a London firm of merchants who wrongly deciphered the word "twirl" as "tweed," and tweed it has been ever since. Corduroy is a name of very ancient lineage. Nowadays worn largely by gamekeepers, the material was once known as the cord-du-roi, or cord of the King. In the time of the Bourbons this ribbed velvet was used as a special mark of distinction for the royal huntsmen of France. Thakli is really a color and not a material, although the name is now given to a familiar army cloth; it is a Hindu word meaning dusty or dirty. Cloth of this color was first worn by British troops at the time of the Indian Mutiny. Melton cloth was so named because the manufacturer, who had been asked to make a rough, unfinished material, deemed it unwise to invoice it as such, so he dubbed it Melton, the name being suggested by Melton Mowbray, where he lived the tailor who first ordered this material.
