

Here and There

Mayor Martin, of Montreal, on behalf of 100 pilgrims to the Eucharistic Congress at Chicago, recently presented a handsome engraved gold watch to Edward P. Whelan, city ticket agent of the C.P.R. at Windsor Station, Montreal, in appreciation of the care and attention bestowed upon them by Mr. Whelan who accompanied the party on their journey to Chicago.

The second greatest half-year in the history of the Canadian Pacific Railway has been completed with the month of July. The official financial statement for this period showing an increase in the gross earnings over the preceding six months of \$10,071,966.66. The increase in the net profits for the same period amounted to \$9,159,041, or an increase amounting to \$1,000,000 in the previous half year in 1927.

Following a slight recession in April the production of automobiles in Canada continued its upward trend in May to reach a new high level of 24,924 units, valued at \$13,761,615. This output compares with 21,502 units, worth \$13,754,990 in the previous month. For the five months ending May the cumulative production was 102,127 units, valued at \$62,586,152, as against 92,229 units valued at \$59,900,000 in the same period last year.

Canada leads the nations of the world in the proportion of years of prosperity to years of depression, says a report now in preparation by the National Bureau of Economic Research, an American organization. Covering the period 1884-1924, Canada shows 1.86 years of prosperity per year of depression. The United States comes next with 1.79 years of prosperity per year of depression, covering the period 1890-1923.

Definite indications of the largest building year Canada had in more than a decade are now shown by the record of the first six months of this year. The very large and unusual total of \$104,645,000 worth of construction for the first half of the current year and contemplated new work to the value of \$304,698,800 forecasts great activity for the remaining months. During June contracts awarded totalled \$4,186,400, an increase over June, 1925, of 68 per cent.

One of the greatest foundations upon which the Canadian national spirit rests was laid by the Canadian Pacific Railway was the conviction uttered by J. D. Cameron, of Glenora, in an address before an audience at Pembroke recently. "Not merely did this railroad act," he said, "as a bond between all the provinces of the Confederation, but it was, by its conception and final construction, a greater force than anything else for the unification of the scattered provinces."

The sea-faring settlers of the Hebrides are not all fishermen as one might expect, but farmers in a small way known in the rugged northern islands as crofters. Father B. A. MacDonald, the clergyman in charge of the immigration of these hardy folk to Western Canada, disclosed this interesting point recently en route to his headquarters at Red Deer, Alberta. Father MacDonald has been in Canada about fifteen years and has been engaged in immigration work during that time.

The Earl of Clarendon is responsible for the statement that of the 25 families who personally inspected, sent out to Canada under the Overseas Settlement League, he has not met with one malcontent. He intimated that the settlers were unanimous in the opinion that Canada had been good to them. His Lordship, accompanied by the Countess of Clarendon and their three children, Lord and Lady Jean Villiers and Hon. Nicholas Villiers, is making a study of the immigration problem as he travels to Banff, Lake Louise, and other points west in the Dominion.

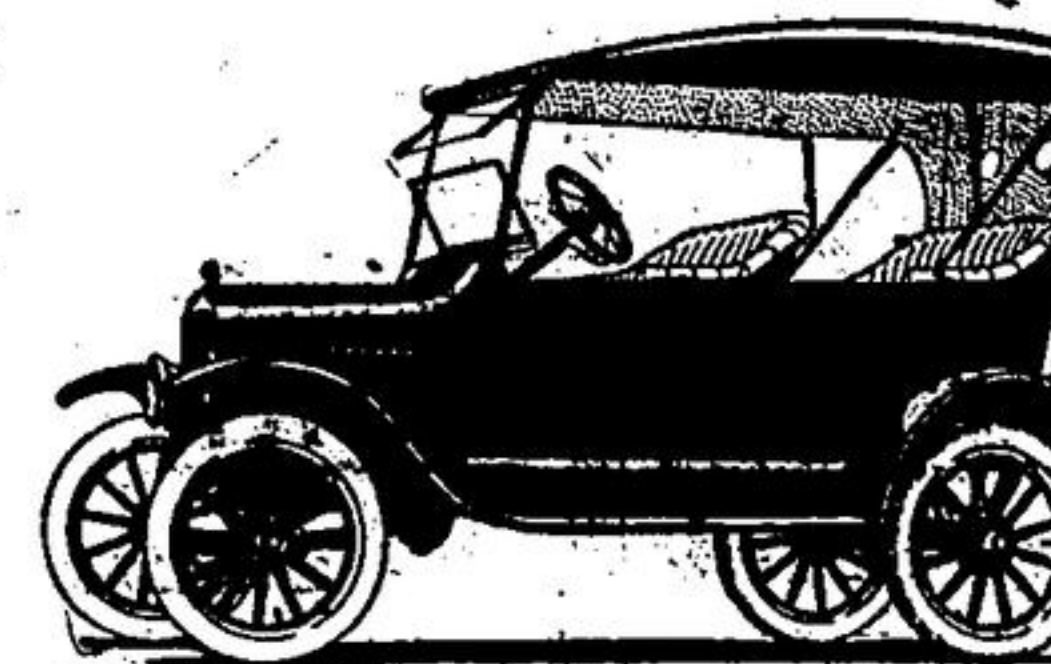

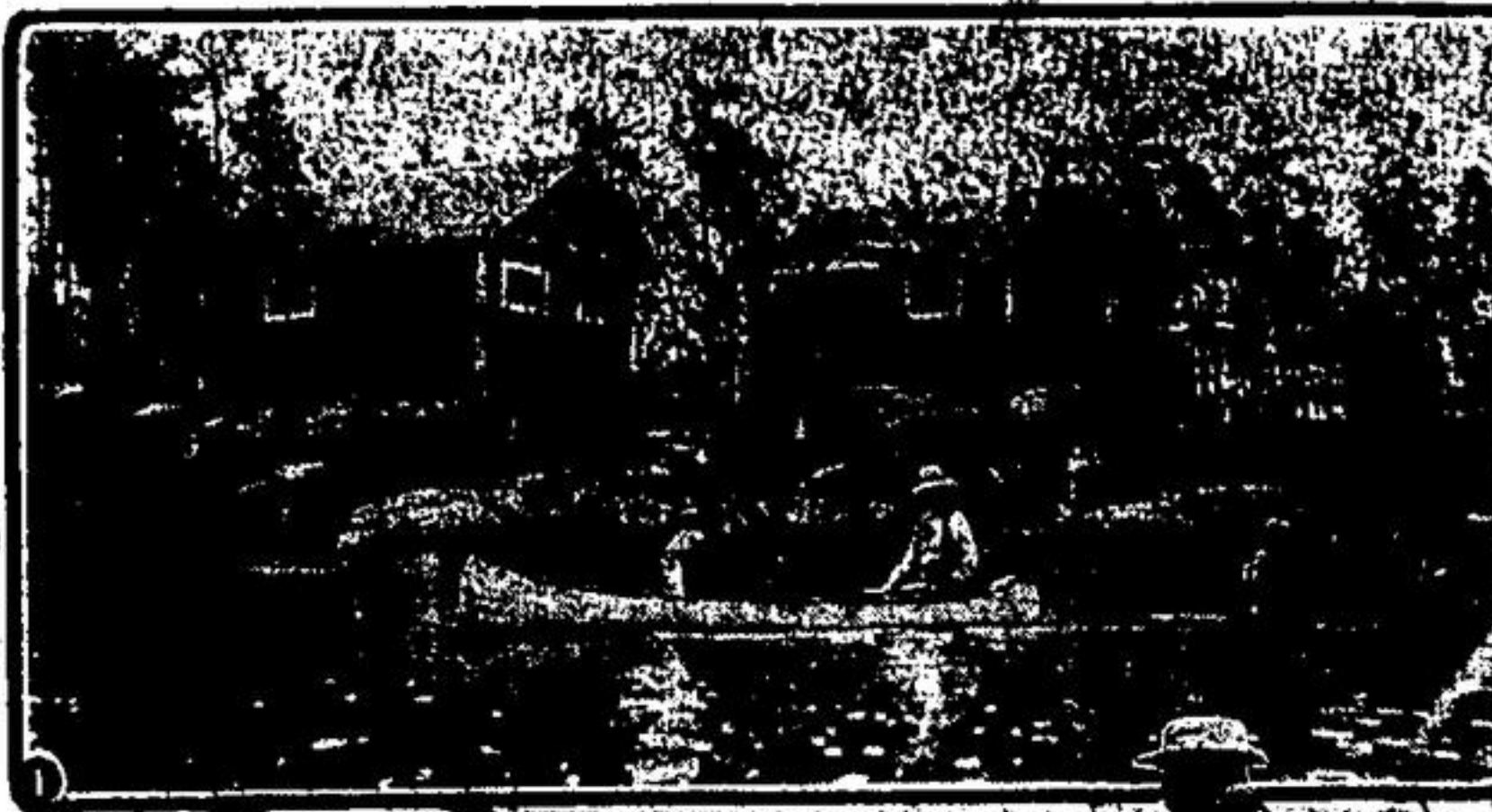

Bass of the North Country



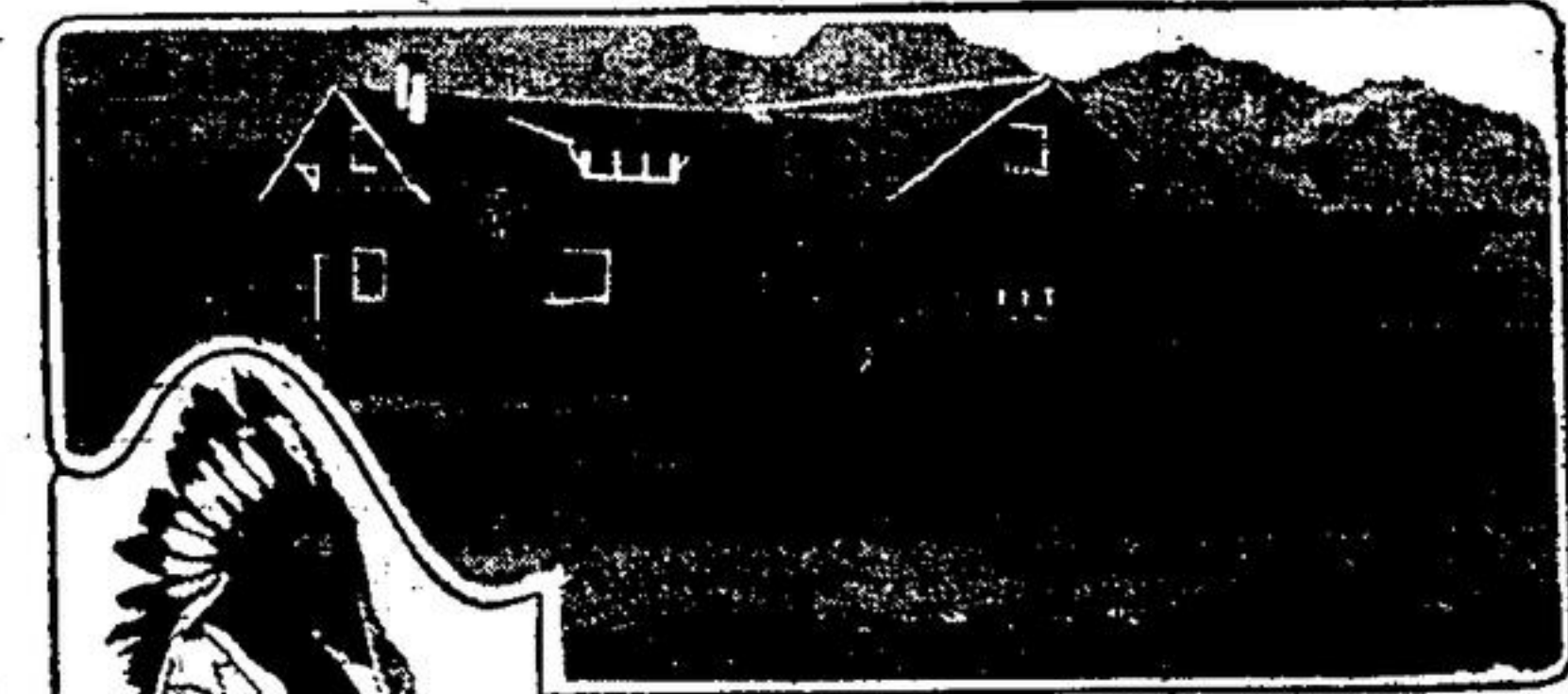
The moods and fishing qualities of the bass of the north country are fully explained in this article, written by Frank Ripley, the well-known authority on angling. Somehow or other, I am never impressed with the ubiquity of bass until I travel into the north parts. Mr. Micropterus, better known as the small mouth bass, often as red-eye, seems to thrive, somehow, wherever you place him. In the South he lives only in swift mountain streams, but in the North country his abiding places are in lakes, where he grows to be a big, lusty fellow, broad, strong and willing to tackle any offering an angler sends his way.

There are parts of the north country where one will be puzzled a bit to find the bass, unless he arrives to bring a rise in a proper manner. They will take the fly with greater avidity than a brook, rainbow or brown trout, but the offering has to be made to their liking or not at all.

FIRST AID TO ANIMALS

ACCIDENTS WILL HAPPEN ON THE FARM.

Some Suggested Remedies and Hints as to the Handling of Hoof—Why Do Pigs Cough?

Accidents will happen on the farm and it is well to be prepared to give first aid to the victim of the accident, while waiting to secure professional help. Nail wounds, cuts, barb wire cuts, injuries from runaways, injuries from coupling in contact with farm tools and machines or any other injury where the skin is broken should receive treatment at once, that the animal may not suffer. Some people still apply turpentine to wounds of animals, doing more injury than good, since it weakens and devitalizes the tissue and retards healing rather than promoting it. Others use large volumes of antiseptic solution in water to bath the wound, this also weakens the tissue and removes the protective serum that nature supplies for the repair of the injury, so should not be used other than during the first cleansing should such be necessary. The application of tincture of iodine to the wound after removing the dirt and loose tissue is the best practice. The application of tincture of iodine will destroy any of the common bacteria that may gain access to the wound, it stimulates healing and tends to stop minor hemorrhage.

In nail and cask wounds there is no agent that will give better results than iodine. Keep the injury clean. If there is hemorrhage, soak clean sterile absorbent cotton with iodine, apply over the wound and bandage. Early attention to wounds will save your horse much needless suffering, and make it easier for the veterinarian to complete the treatment. Don't be afraid to pour on the tincture of iodine. Keep your fingers off the wound, and see that everything that touches it is sterile. A supply of iodine and absorbent cotton should be at hand on every farm where live stock is part of the farm equipment.—L. Stevenson, O. A. C.

Keep the Pigs Cool

The pig, that is comfortable all the time, is a great maker. The pig that is uncomfortable from any cause, particularly overheating will not do well. One of the worst causes of this is made while he is using energy looking for comfort. Pigs kept in open lots with no shelter from the hot sun other than that afforded by the fence, cannot make the same gains as those that enjoy the shelter of trees or a sunshade. A sunshade can be easily made by setting four fence posts in a square, eight feet apart on each side, to support a roof frame of 2 x 4 or 2 x 6, which is covered over with hay, straw or boards. Hay or straw roofing is cooler than boards. Dust can be kept down by the use of oil or kerosene. Give the pig comfort, he will sweat, walk and squeal. There is no profit in such actions, and you won't get three cents out of every pound of grain that he eats if you let him do it. The sunshade will help.—L. Stevenson, Dept. of Extension, O. A. College.

Cutting Down Farm Expenses

The farmer must meet his own problems in a masterful way. Failing to do so, all efforts by the Department of Agriculture in his behalf will avail no progress. To keep up the desired standard of living on Ontario farms the labor income must be increased. Should the farm be earning all that it can, then the possibility of increasing income must come from saving effected on operating. Can feed bills be eliminated by growing better feeds on the farm? Some Ontario farmers have done so. Can waste of labor, stable space, and feeds be avoided by getting rid of poor producing cows? Many Ontario farmers have done so, and now use the machine wherever possible. They also plan their work so that they are always busy themselves and everything is done in its proper time. Every dollar saved in operation is a dollar added to the labor income.

Minerals for Swine

1 part common salt. they are to develop a bony framework and make the best use of the feeds given. Minerals are necessary at all times, winter and summer, indoors and out, on pasture or in the pen. The following mixture has given good results, all ingredients by weight: 10 parts wood ashes 10 parts ground limestone 10 parts acid phosphate 1 part common salt. Pigs should have access to such a mixture and also to rock salt. The blood of a normal pig contains nearly one per cent of salt, this salt must be kept up and the man that carries the feed to the pig is the one to do it.

Why the Pigs Cough

Thumping, cough, unthriftiness and digestive disturbances in pigs from one to six weeks old are usually symptoms of the presence of lung worms. Treatment of the affected ones is of little value. If the number of ascariids present in the lung is large the little pig will soon turn up his toes. If the numbers are limited the pig may outgrow the malady. Proper sanitation coupled with proper cleansing of the sow prior to farrowing effectively prevents the thumpy condition caused by the young worms in the lungs and bronchioles of the little pig.—L. Stevenson, Dept. Extension, O. A. College.
