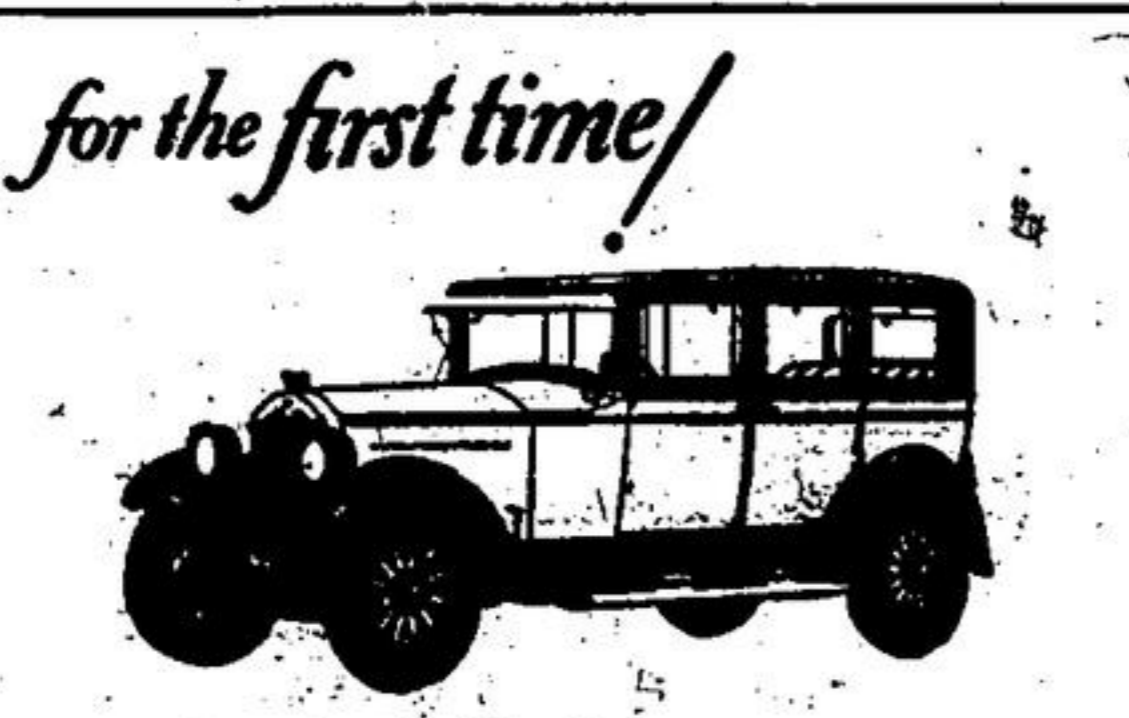

### 5,000 BLACK KNIGHTS GATHER IN BRAMPTON

A Notable Event

For the first time in its history Brampton, which has entertained Orangemen on many occasions, extended a warm welcome last Thursday to the visiting Royal Black Knights of Ireland, numbering close to five thousand brethren, including Sir Joseph Davison, grand master of Belfast, and Lady Davison. Sir Joseph and his wife were the guests of the County Chapter of York.

The knights, their friends and others, populated the town as it had never been before. The whistles and cheering of horses, so evident in the frenzied celebration, was supplanted by the pipes, fife and drums of the bands accompanying the various processions. The appearance of the Sir Knights added a dignified touch to the celebration.

The town presented a patriotic and colorful appearance. The business section was decorated with flags and streamers, and the streets, through the night five arches had been constructed, one at Gage Park, two on Main Street and two on Queen Street. Churches and societies co-operated with Canon Walsh preceptor to provide refreshments for the immense crowd.

### MILTON

Word has been received by Messrs. Wm. and T. D. Hume that their nephew, George Hume, son of the late Jas. Hume, had died suddenly while on a fishing trip.

Jack Powell, of Cedar Springs, south of Milton, was seriously injured when he was crushed between a stone boat and the cement wall of his bank barn. His right leg was badly broken in two places and he received internal injuries.

In an exhibition softball game played at the Athletic Park here last Saturday afternoon, the Milton County Wolves softball team, leaders of the Milton, and the Guelph Senior Softball League, defeated Waterloo, leaders of the Hamilton District Softball League, by 13 to 8. The game was the best seen here this season. - Reformer.

Miss Jean C. Lindsay, D.N., of Toronto, is spending a month's vacation at her home here.

Rev. Dr. W. M. Kannawin, of Toronto, was greeted by large congregations at Knox Church last Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. John Nicholson, of Markham, and other friends were during the week.

The Ladies' Aid of Knox Church are engaged in collecting a mile of copper for the funds of the society. Mrs. H. S. Holmes had the misfortune during the week by a misstep, while at the home of Mr. N. F. Lindsay for the week and Mrs. W. Arnold, to fall on the cement walk, and painfully bruise and abrade her left limb. - Free Press.

### GENERAL NEWS

After a brief vacancy, following the resignation of Rev. J. F. Strachan, who went to Owen Sound, the congregation of St. John's, of Campbellville have called Rev. Donald McQueen, recent graduate of Knox College.

The farmers of the County of Wellington will lose practically all their turnips. Maggots work on the roots and plant life has been destroyed. In the north of the county where worms are playing havoc with the crops. The situation is similar to that in Wellington.

The Spectator reports that more than \$500,000 of American money, received from tourists, has passed through Hamilton banks within the last three months and much more has been in circulation, not deposited, as there is a one per cent. discount on U. S. money. Much more must have been spent in Toronto and great deal in circulation in Milton.

John Carr and F. C. Willmott, of Trafalgar Township, have finished hauling in their fall wheat, which is ready for thrashing. Both of these experienced farmers, who own two of the finest farms in Ontario, estimate that their fall wheat will yield not less than 40 bushels to the acre. Reports show that there will be bumper grain crops in Halton County this year.

An accident occurred on Friday night near Clarkson, when a coupe hit a truck driven by a local driver. The coupe was badly damaged by the impact and a lady passenger was injured. The injured party demanded hospital treatment and was removed to St. Joseph's Hospital, Toronto.

Leo Jacobs, who claims to be the champion apple picker of Ontario, has established a cherry picking record, having picked 60 bushels of Montmorency cherries in 9 hours. Mr. Jacobs works on David Prately's farm in Nelson Township, near the town of Milton.

The secretary of the Kincardine School Board is said to have received less than 100 applications for the various staff vacancies of the Public and High Schools, coming from every point in Ontario.

Mr. James Goodfellow, 6th line, Alliston, secured a setting of English pheasant eggs from the government and now has ten chicks, one month old, which will soon be allowed their freedom. There is a very heavy penalty for destroying these birds.

A tourist party from Indianapolis, Ind., were the victims of a contemptible hoax at Great Oakes, while camping at the motor camp grounds at Harrison Park. Tourist supplies such as fishing equipment, cameras, etc., to the value of \$25, were stolen from the tent while the members of the party were down town purchasing supplies.

Thousands of men going west for the harvest will be franchised on the way to Ontario.

When Mr. Robt. Armstrong, of Erin, and a party of young men were returning from the sports at Ardath on Wednesday of last week they saw a fine large buck deer north of Marsville. The big fellow crossed the road, clearing both fences, and disappeared.

Billy Evans, the painter, of Acton, fell with a ladder while painting a barn house in Erin Township last Friday. His right hand was badly sprained and both knees badly bruised.

### Notes and Comments

**STORES** where the clerks are courteous have an enormous advantage over those where the assistants are either rude or coolly indifferent. People appreciate courtesy regardless of their own address or uncouthness - the more be courteous. There is a wide difference between courtesy and servility. Courtesy is not difficult to acquire and stamps a person as one hundred per cent.

**RECENTLY** a newspaper in the county sent out twenty letters asking representative subscribers what feature of the paper appealed to them most. Replies showed that over half were most interested in the store news. There is no question but the people read the advertisements. If the business man will put as much time and thought into his advertising as into any other feature of his work, he will get results.

**SUPPLIES** of the new issue of five, ten and twenty cent postage stamps engraved are expected in the local Post Office soon. The issue was made to commemorate the beginning of the sixtieth year of Confederation and the restoration of the penny postage rate. The new stamps will appreciate a new issue of two cent stamps of the red or rose color. The green two-cent stamp makes a letter resemble an ordinary circular.

**UNLESS** checked within reasonable times an outbreak of hog cholera in Middlesex threatens farmers with large financial loss. Agricultural officials have issued a warning to the farmer to seek expert advice. The least suspicion is entertained that their hogs are victims of the disease. During the last two years mild cases of the cholera have been reported, but immediate steps were taken to stamp it out. It is generally believed that an increase of the disease among the hogs was noticed. One farmer alone is reported to have lost over \$1000 when it became necessary for health officers to destroy his entire pen.

**IN SPITE** of the heat which is affecting most quarters of the Dominion, the selection of candidates for the election post on space from the party leaders are on tour. Mr. Meighen is devoting much time to the tariff question. He claims that the expansion of export trade has been due to the export of raw materials of field, mine and forest and replacement of a large part of raw materials for the benefit of the United States. While Mr. Meighen's appeals to the Maritime provinces include much more of policy as regards transportation, Mr. King in the West has adopted a slogan of "Help of the C.N.E." which accuses Mr. Meighen of offering advice on its policy as soon as he was in office. He also attacked the expansion of the constitutional question to the West, and declares that Lord Byng "had acted as a tool of the party."

**NOXIOUS** weeds are said to seed now and those who neglect to have them cut down are liable to a penalty. Some have had them cut, but many are standing in town and are an eyesore, the more so on account of the many beautiful flowers and shrubs in private grounds, in Victoria Park, at the Milton Inn, the post office and the town hall, and on the Main Street boulevard. Officers and inspectors are required to enforce the provisions of the following paragraph in the Statute: "Every inspector, overseer of highways or other officer, who refuses to remove or cause to be removed any weeds or plants which grow or are growing before the expiration of the year set out or have them cut down at the owner's expense, but that no such notice is necessary in regard to vacant or unoccupied lands."

**ELIMINATION** of speed limits for automobiles together with drastic punishments for careless, negligent or otherwise incompetent drivers, the licensing of all drivers, who would be called upon to pass a rigid examination as to physical and mental fitness, the re-examination of licenses of drivers whose nerves are shocked in accidents, whether through their own or others' fault, were some of the suggestions given to the convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities at London by A. W. Campbell, Commissioner of Highways, Department of Railways and Canals, Ottawa. His address was so highly appreciated by the franchise simulators that they failed to take the necessary steps to put on the voters' list.

**RESIDENTS** of the County are warned that having voted in the Federal election of last October does not ensure the presence of their name on the list for the coming election. A new list is being made for this election, just as a new one was made for last year, and if any person is not positive that his or her name is on the list for this year the thing to do is to go to the Registrar of their riding. Any person who does not take the trouble to see to his or her name is on this year's list is liable to be without a vote when the election day arrives. In an election as important as the one which Canada now faces, the least that the humble elector can do to see that his name is on the list. At every election there are hundreds of persons who are unable to exercise the franchise simply because they failed to take the necessary steps to be put on the voters' list.

**Sparrows Cease.**  
 Readers are warned that there have been circulated through the district a number of spurious twenty-five cent pieces, allegedly of American origin. The coin is made of almost pure lead, but is a splendid piece of workmanship, bearing in almost perfect detail the character inscribed on a real United States quarter. Very little wear and tear, however, discloses the material used in its manufacture. On one side of the coin is a figure of the American eagle and on the other "Liberty." The words "In God We Trust" are fully reproduced in design and engraving the same as in the genuine currency.

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
