Wm. S. Poole

After an illness of some months, death came peacefully to William James Poole in his 81st year. He was a native of Marlston, Kent, England. Previous to his coming to Canada 20 years ago, he served with the Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment 11 years and the color sergeant in Eastern Canada. For 12 years he was Section Foreman at Naval on the C. N. Railway. He leaves to mourn his loss a wife and two daughters. The funeral which took place on Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 17th, from the residence of his mother-in-law, Mrs. R. D. Davis, and was largely attended. Services were held in St. George's Church, directed by the Rev. Roy F. H. Nixon, integrating taking place at Greenwood Cemetery. Floral tributes were numerous and beautiful. The pall bearers were as follows: Messrs. H. Hark, J. A. Ballantine, J. Mason, W. Whittier, D. Harley, and R. Close.

**Mrs. R. F. Cameron**  
At an early hour Saturday morning, Aug. 21st, Margaret Ketchum, widow of the late Rev. R. F. Cameron passed away after a long season of sickness and suffering.

The late Mrs. Cameron was born in East Lothian, Scotland, in 1845, and was the daughter of James Cameron who was then a young graduate of Knox College and beginning his work as a minister of the gospel with in the Presbyterian Church. For some years ago Mrs. Cameron was elected President of the Toronto Presbyterial of the W.M.S. and upon the re-organization of the church subsequent to the 10th of June 1925, Mrs. Cameron was again elected President, a position which she retained until her death.

The funeral service was held at her late residence and was conducted by the pastor of Knox Presbyterian Church assisted by Rev. W. M. McKay of Toronto and Rev. James McFaul of Milton. Her mortal remains were laid to rest beside those of her late husband in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. There were present at the funeral and representing the executive of the Toronto Presbyterial Mrs. Anderson, Mrs. Smith and Mrs. McGeogal from Toronto.

Among the relatives present were: Mrs. John Thompson, a sister of the deceased, her sons Douglas and Walter, Mrs. J. B. Mitchell another sister, Mr. J. B. Other friends were Mr. and Mrs. Harry Barber, Toronto; Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Lawrence, of Toronto, and Miss L. Steiss, Cranbrook. A brother, Mr. Ketchum, of Winnipeg was unable to be present.

Many floral tributes showed the esteem in which the departed was held. In the absence of the local undertaker, Mr. Johnston of Acton performed these duties in a kindly and most acceptable manner. Near neighbors had an opportunity of showing kindness in a most valuable service during the time of sickness and at the funeral. The pallbearers were—Messrs. Geo. Henderson, R. Clark, L. Grant, A. L. Hume, S. Harrison, and D. Somerville.
