Georgetown, Sept. 7 1926 Council met with Reeve McIntyre in the chair and councillors all present. The minutes of the four previous meetings were read and confirmed. The elections throughout the Dominion yesterday were somewhat of a surprise to many. At midnight last night the Canadian Press reported election of 219 members out of 245, distributed by parties as follows: Liberals 106 Progressive 83 Federal Progressives 11 U.F.A. 7 Independents 2 Doubtful 26 In Halton Dr. Anderson was elected by a majority of about 2300 His majority in Georgetown was 227 and 147 in Glenwilliams. White-wartown gave him majority of 43 for Hampshire. A full report of the returns in Halton will be published next issue.

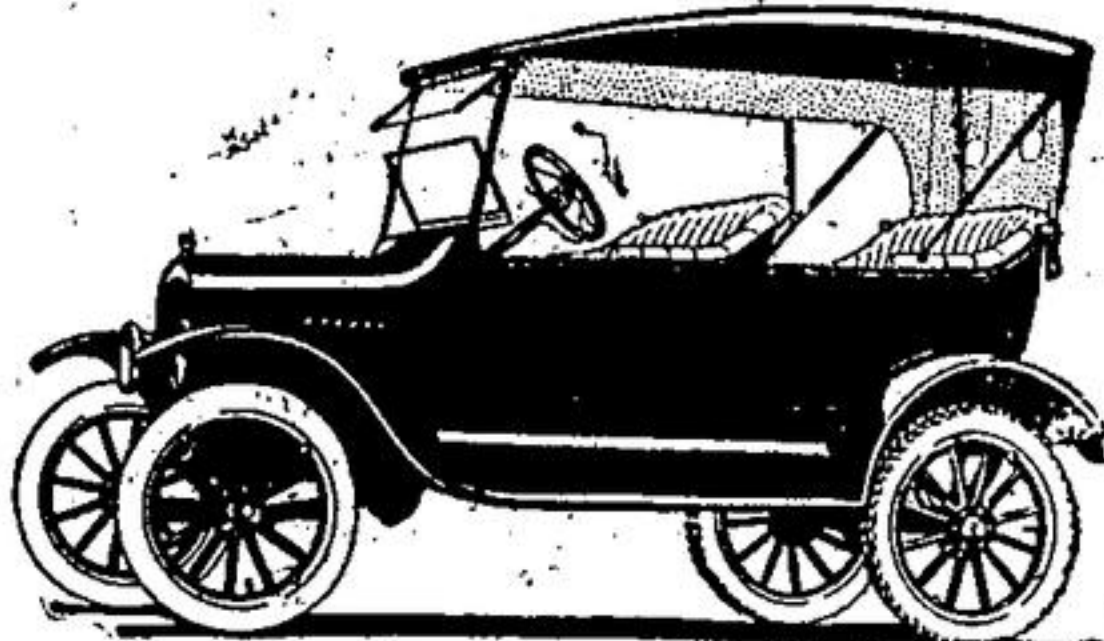

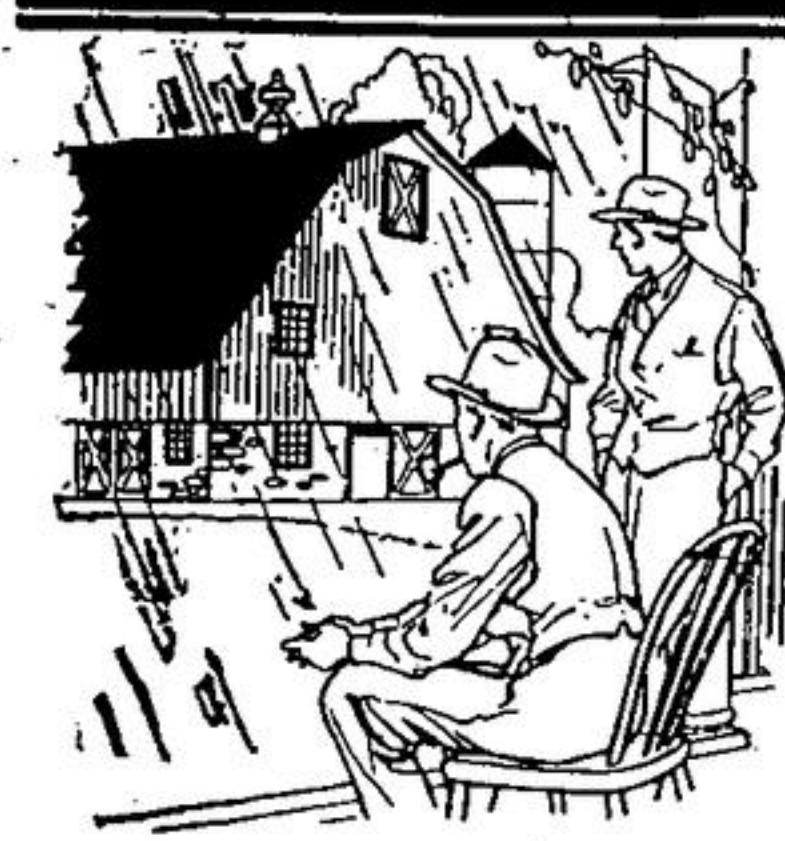
