Here and There

Vancouver According to statistics prepared by the Vancouver Merchants' Exchange, the foreign trade export of the port has increased 400 per cent. in the past five years, while the import trade has increased 100 per cent.

In a recent report from the Canadian Pacific Agents at Shanghai received at Montreal it is stated that the summer in vicinity of Shanghai has been trying on account of drought. This may have a disastrous effect on the crops. The long and intense heat wave was only recently broken by a typhoon which struck the Coast near Shanghai.

A plan is projected by the Osaka Prefectural Government authorities in Japan for the promotion of a large exposition in commemoration of the tenth anniversary of the restoration of world peace. It is expected that the exposition will be opened in Osaka in 1929. The plans for the exposition, which will be carried out at tremendous cost, have been approved by the Prime Minister.

So successful on Canadian farms have been young bachelors, who, prior to residence in this country were students in agriculture at the Huddleigh Salvation Army Schools in Essex, England, that the Army will shortly receive into those institutions their first classes of married men destined for farm lands in the Dominion. The course will be given during six months, and will mean a thorough training in branches of agriculture, particularly adapted to conditions in Canada.

Prospects for the establishment of an air route in Japan for mail and passenger service have brightened with the announcement that the Ministry of Communications has included an appropriation in the budget of the Communications Department for such a service. It is anticipated that there will be enough passengers willing to pay double the railroad fare for the sake of speed between Osaka and Tokyo, the leading cities of Japan.

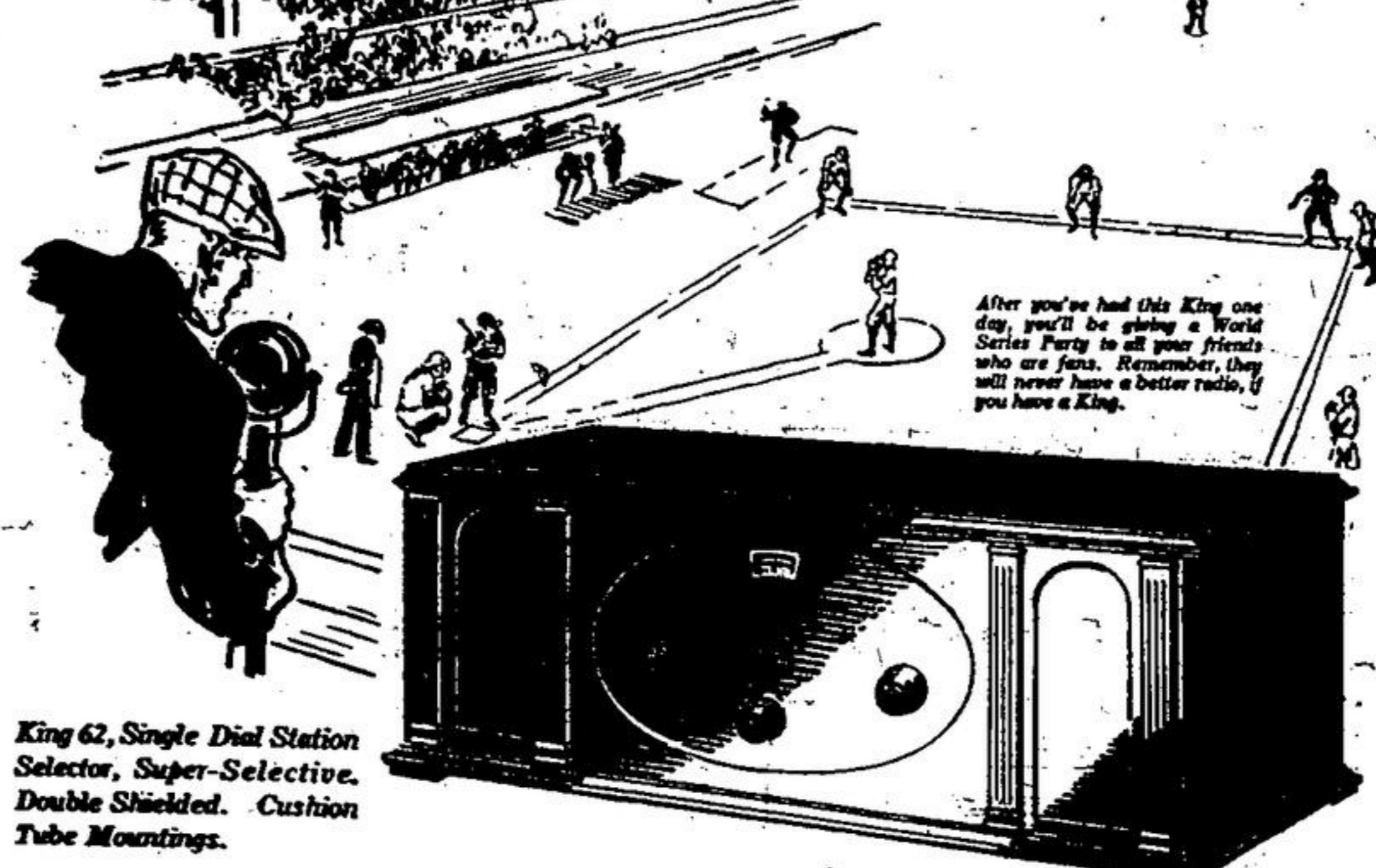

Scandals of Child Marriages

An important change in marriage law is foreshadowed in Ontario, the Government intending, it is stated, to introduce legislation raising the legal age of marriage. Some inquiries have already been made on the subject and the result is striking. The most amazing discovery thus far is that made by the Home Secretary, who stated recently that he had divided into an infant marriage laws, and that he was not at all sure it would not turn out that the legal age of marriage is two!

At present the law on this point is obscure, but most authorities take the view that the legal age of marriage is twelve for girls and fourteen for boys, and in practice some girls are married in their early teens. In a recent year the Registrar General of England recorded the marriage of one girl of thirteen, three girls of fourteen, and thirty of fifteen.

Most of such marriages take place in church, because difficulty in connection with age are more easily overcome than when the ceremony is strictly civil. In a number of cases the frequently asked on the score of age. Not long since a registrar took objection to a marriage of a girl of sixteen and a woman who was said to be over twenty-one, and asked for proof of the bride's age to be produced when the parties came to be married. At the time appointed for the ceremony the couple entered the office, and the bride explained that she could not get a birth certificate in England, as she was born in New Zealand. The registrar consequently refused to perform the ceremony, and the couple, still unmarried, left the office.

On the other hand, many girls of tender age have been married in church. There was a case in point at Carmarthen in 1920, when a girl of twelve was, unknown to her father, married to a school teacher. After living with her husband during a holiday period, she returned home, where she died in 1922.

A curious story was told by a minor who petitioned for nullity of marriage. According to her statement, her mother forced her into matrimony, and she went through the marriage ceremony under the impression that she was formally betrothing herself to her husband. The petition, however, was dismissed.

A still stranger instance of parental coercion came to light during the hearing of a charge of bigamy at Devonshire House, England. The petitioner, a woman of twenty-three, stated that when she was sixteen her mother told her to "marry" a man for £13, only £1 of which, however, she actually paid. She married the man, but "I was," she said, "married as much a chattel as anything offered for sale in the market." When her mother died, she thought that she was free again, and "married" a pedlar.

Still more curious are the situations to which child marriages give rise. A girl of sixteen married a man twenty years her senior, and had two young brothers, and she looked after all three of them. Twelve years subsequently the husband died, whereupon both of the brothers proposed to their foster-mother, who accepted one of them.

Another girl, who was married to a plager of worship, had such religious scruples subsequently that she was married to a Roman Catholic, a Presbyterian, a Baptist, a Unitarian, a Swedenborgian, a Spiritualist, and to one—in all, nine times, and to the same man in eight years. Then the husband was disinherited and wanted to be married (for the tenth time) by a Congregational minister. The wife also was disinherited—but she wanted a divorce.

A third girl blamed her early marriage, which took place when she was fifteen, for a curious complication, though it might have arisen had she waited for ten years longer or more. She married the older son in a corn-law, and soon afterwards the son's father married his son's sister-in-law. This ruined the father's younger son, who, not to be outdone, married a younger sister-in-law of his brother. So the brothers married their aunts, were their own uncles, and were brothers-in-law to their father!
