. Some inquiries have already been made on the subject, and the result is startling. The most amazing disentery thus far is that made by the Bome Secretary, who ented recently that he had dived tuto ancient marriage laws, and that he was not at all sure it would not tuen out that the egal age of marriage is two! At present the law on this point is obscure; but most authorities take the ship that the legal act of marrage is twelve for girls and fourteen for hoys, and is practice some girls are married in their early teens. In a recent year the Registrar General of England recorded the marriage of one girl of thirteen, three girls of tourteen, and thirty of tifteen. Most of ruch marriages take place to church, because difficulties in consection with age are more easily or reome than when the ceremony is merely civil. In register offices trouble frequently arises on the score of age. Not long since a registrar took provisional notice of a marriage beween a man and a woman who was

said to be over twenty-one, and asked for proof of the bride-elect's age to be produced when the parties came to be married. At the time appointed for the ceremony the couple entered the office, and the bride explained that she could not get a birth certificate in England, as she was born in New Zealand. The registrar consequently ranged to perform the ceremony, and couple, still unarried, left the office disconsolate, fender age have been married in church.
