**Obituary**

WILFRED McMASTER

The many friends of the late Wilfred McMaster have been deeply grieved because of his passing. After several months of patient suffering his death on Monday, September 27th, brought his life to an untimely end, he being at death but a few months past his twenty-seventh birthday. Wilfred had attended Public School at Glenwilliams and High School at Georgetown; he was a member of Georgetown Baptist Church and in all his association has amiable, considerate disposition has never failed to endear him to his friends. Since leaving school Wilfred had lived for a year or two in Toronto but had now returned to his home town where he has been continuing his studies which caused his death he had resided in Detroit. He had been engaged in drapery work there in one of the leading drapery concerns of that city. He possessed a rather keen sense of the esthetic which seemed to fit him for this particular work, and had shortly before illness overtook him been placed in charge of the department he had served. Throughout life he had displayed a manly ambition in the direction of a good and useful life and gentility was an outstanding feature of his character. The fact that his illness and passing have interrupted a romance and prevented its happy culmination add to his death a little more than the usual pathos. The funeral was held from the residence of his father, Mr. Robert McMaster, Glenwilliams, on Wednesday afternoon last at 2:30 o'clock. The service was conducted by the Rev. J. H. Harton of Toronto, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Dyke of Georgetown. Besides the many friends and acquaintances of local residence there were present others from Toronto, London, Port Perry, Detroit and Hamilton. The many beautiful floral tributes bore witness of the esteem in which deceased was held. His father and mother, three brothers, Samuel and Robert of Toronto and Edward at home; and three sisters, Ethel of Toronto, Elsie of London, and Ivy at home, survived to mourn his loss. Interment took place at Glenwilliams Cemetery.
