Dumbells at Brampton

"Joy Bombs" is the aptly descriptive title of the newest Dumbells review, which will be seen at the Capitol Theatre, Brampton, on one night, Wednesday, Oct. 20th.

From the moment of its premier in Toronto in August, "Joy Bombs" has had immediate favor with the audiences in every city where The Dumbells have appeared on this their eighth annual tour of the north.

Those of us who thought that Capt. Plunkett was nearing the end of his resources as a producer after eight years of staging two, new reviews, will be pleased to note that the new year has been agreeably surprised to find just the opposite. "Joy Bombs" in addition to being entirely new is vastly different. Only the cast remains the same. The only change there is in addition, All the old favorites are included in the line-up.

The first half of the show is punctuated by three remarkably clever and distinctly varied types of sketches. The first is pre-war military. The second clever satiric, while the third is characterization plus atmosphere—the typical London coster being portrayed. The entire company is required for this scene, which is the most colorful of the whole show.

The second part of the program jumps straight into the realms of modern musical comedy. One setting—the promenade deck of an ocean liner, provides the necessary background for the action. During the major part of the act Captain Plunkett's Orchestra, under the efficient leadership of Howard Fogg, is stationed on stage and provide the music necessary to the song songs, as well as contributing a budget of the newest dance songs, plus a few of the standard and classic selections that always find such favor with the music lovers who make up a large part of the average audience.
