Sam Carter, prominently identified with the temperance movement in Geolphi for many years and a former member of the Legislature, was unanimously chosen to oppose Hon. Lincoln Goldie, Provincial secretary, at a joint convention of the Liberals, Progressives and Prohibition Unions of South Wellington held at the City Hall on Saturday afternoon. The meeting was largely attended, fifteen being nominated, all of whom withdrew but Sam Carter and T. E. Bissell, Elora, secretary of the Prohibition Union.
One of the greatest demonstrations of confidence in a member was evidenced last Saturday, when 450 delegates from every polling subdivision in Peel County met in Oddfellows' Hall, Brampton, to express the unanimous desire to have Col. T. L. Kennedy again represent Peel in the coming Provincial election. There was about of "No" when the president of the Peel Liberal-Conservative Association, Mrs. Emily Urquhart, asked whether there were any other nominations. The audience started to cheer after voicing its desire and it was fully 10 minutes before the nominee was able to make himself heard.
