





By-Law 35A



By-law to Regulate the Traffic in the Public Streets of the Town of

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown micts as follows:

1. In this By-law: (a) "Street" shall include a common and public highway, avenue, ... parkway, siriveway, square, place, Didge, viuluct or trestle, designed and intended for, or used by the general public for the passage of vehi-

(b) "Vehicle" shall include moto vehicle, trailers, traction, engine and any vehicle drawn, propelled or driven by any kind of power including muscular power, but not including the cars of electric or steam milways running only upon rails. (c) "Park" as applied to a vehicle shall mean to allow the same to re-

main standing on a street for a longer period than five minutes. (d) "Stand" as applied to a vehicle time longer than actually required to take on or discharge passengers or

2. Absolute control of street traffic is vested in the Chief of Police. 3. Vehicles moving slowly shall keep as close as possible to the curb on the right; allowing more swiftly

moving vehicles free passage to their 4. Drivers of vehicles before starting, turning, stopping or changing their course shall make sure that such movement can be made in safety and without obstructing traffic and shall give a visible signal to persons driv-ing behind them of their intention to

make such movement. 5. Vehicles turning to the right to an intersection street shall pass and turn the corner as near to the right

hand curb as possible. 6. Vehicles intending to furn to the left into an intersecting street shall continue beyond the centre of the intersection before turning.

7. The driver of a vehicle upon the approach or sounding of signal of an ambulance, police vehicle, fire wagon or other fire apparatus shall immediately draw up said vehicle as near as practicable to the right hand curb and parallel thereto and bring it to a standstill.

S. No vehicle shall be allowed to remain upon or be driven through any street so as to blockade or obstruct traffic, and no vehicle shall be so overloaded that the horse or horses or motor power shall be unable to move it at a reasonable rate of speed 9. No vehicle shall enter or emerge from an alley, stable, driveway, or garage without giving a warning sig-

nal or at a rate faster than a walk. 10. No vehicle shall remain backed up to a curb except during actual loading or unloading from it and in such case no longer than the actual loading or unloading requires. The horse or horses attached to a vehicle backed up to a curb shall be turned at right angles to the vehicle and in the direction in which the traffic on the street is moving.

11. Vehicles shall not stop on or obstruct crossings. 12. No vehicle shall stop so as to obstruct the entrance to any lane or driveway into private garages or into any building. The occupant of any business or property on any street stall be given space for parking on such street if such space is required

by him, subject to the regular rules

No horse or vehicle shall be left in such a manner as to obstruct the ordinary traffic of the streets. and no horse or vehicle shall be parked on any street an unreasonable time having regard to the traffic requirements of the street in question. 14. No vehicle shall stand within six feet of a fire hydrant.

15. No vehicle shall be parked on any bridge within the Municipality. 16. No vehicle shall stand or park firectly opposite another vehicle which is already standing on the other side of the street, where such standing or parking would prevent the free passage of two lines of traffic.
