Dr. W. Willoughby—Geor.
 Dr. Wesley Willoughby, one of Geor.'s best-known business men, died very suddenly on Saturday morning, Nov. 27th, the victim of a paralytic stroke. Apparently following in his usually good health, Dr. Willoughby, who had been acting as deputy returning officer at the advance polls for the riding of South Wellington in the Ontario election, had been at his office all day and up to the time the poll closed at 10 o'clock at night, but shortly after that hour collapsed in the office of R. S. Call, returning officer for the constituency, where he had gone to turn in his ballot box. He was removed to the General Hospital, where his death followed a few hours later.

The late Dr. Willoughby was born in Caledon, Ontario, on September 29th, 1871, a son of the late John and Margaret Willoughby. For 15 years he practiced dentistry in Pennsylvania, coming to Geor. in 1913. He bought the livery business of the estate of the late Edward Palmer on Curden Street, and for a number of years he operated this, afterwards dealing in real estate, which business he followed until the time of his death.

He was prominently connected with the Masonic Order, being a Royal Arch Mason, a member of the Knight Templar and of the Ramesses Temple Shrines, Toronto. Deceased was an active member of the Geor. Rotary Club, in the work of which he took keen interest. His wife predeceased him 10 years ago. He is survived by one son, Wesley Willoughby of Caledonia, Pa., and four brothers, William of Nepean, Mass.; Senator A. R. of Moose Jaw, S. J. of Ottawa, and John A. of Toronto, and two sisters, Mrs. Collins of Winnipeg and Mrs. Beck of Geor.
