Farm Fire in Requeing

At six o'clock Tuesday morning fire caused by either overcast stove pipes or a spark from the chimney falling on the roof, completely destroyed the fine brick residence on the farm owned by Miss Maud Carradice, formerly owned and willed to Miss Carradice by the late Charles H. Scott, who died a year ago, 5th line, Requeing, seven miles from Acton. The house was occupied by Miss Carradice and her mother, who were out at the barn milking when the fire broke out in the second story. The contents of the house, except a few pieces of furniture, saved from the ground floor, were also totally destroyed. By good work on the part of neighbors, who rushed to the scene of the fire in answer to calls for help the barns were saved. The total loss, including contents, is estimated at \$8,000, partly covered by insurance.

United Church

Ben. Richard Blain Dead

Senator Richard Blain passed quietly away last Saturday morning at his home in Brampton, after an illness of over two years, the result of a stroke of paralysis. The whole county of Peel is mourning the passing of a man who was very highly esteemed by all classes and parties.

The late Senator Blain was the son of the late Captain Isaac Blain, a native of Cumberland, England, and was born in Vienna, Ont., in 1867. After receiving his education in the public school he entered the hardware business in Brampton, which he later turned over to his son. For many years he was a member of the Brampton Town Council, and subsequently deputy-reeve and reeve of Brampton and Warden of Peel County. At the general federal elections he was returned as Conservative member for Peel, subsequently becoming party whip. At the succeeding elections of 1904, 1908 and 1911 he was also returned and in 1917 he was summoned to the Senate. The late Mr. Blain was married in 1884 to Miss Hattie James, of Peel County, who predeceased him about a year ago. He was a former vice-president of the Ontario Liberal-Conservative Association, a prominent member of the Sons of Soodland, and also an Orangeman. One son, Rowell, and one daughter, Mrs. Dr. A. L. Robinson, both of Brampton, survive.

In Grace United Church, to which Senator Blain belonged, F. W. Duggan at Sunday night's service paid a fitting tribute to the deceased whom he had known intimately for fifty years.
