

Here and There

Philadelphia—The silver cup for the best display of poultry at the Sesquicentennial Poultry Show was won by the Hon. John S. Martin, Ontario Minister of Agriculture.

A newly constructed line of the Canadian Pacific Railway between Uman and Llyodwastere in the Province of Saskatchewan is now in operation. This line 304 miles in length will greatly assist the farmers of the district in marketing their grain.

Hope plans are now being sent to England, where they are in prime condition. The Ontario Department of Agriculture reports having made a trial shipment with excellent results, as attested by word from the other side. The plans were packed ripe and fully colored.

Vancouver—The largest shipment of tree seeds ever made within the British Empire was that of 3,200 lbs. of yellow pine seed sent from New Westminster to New Zealand by the Dominion Government seed extraction plant at the former place. A further cargo of 2,500 lbs. of seed is to follow shortly. This seed will be planted on waste lands in New Zealand.

Quebec—The Canadian Pacific Railway has decided to add three hundred rooms to its famous hotel, the Chateau Frontenac, and to meet the requirements has taken options on a number of properties near the present buildings. Through the construction of the proposed new wing the Chateau Frontenac will probably become the largest hotel in the British Empire, having some 1,200 rooms.

Christmas travel from Canada to the Old Country is expected to be exceedingly heavy this year over the C.P.R. lines and by the Canadian Pacific Lines. High wheat prices and good crops are given as the cause for this exodus. The rush will be inaugurated virtually by the sailing of the C.P.R. liner Montreal on December 7, for which a special train will be run to ship side at Saint John.

Recognized throughout the West as two of the outstanding authorities on mountain transportation, James and William A. Browster, president and general manager respectively of the Browster Transportation Company, visited Canadian Pacific headquarters in Montreal and in an interview for the press predicted great popularity for Banff, Lake Louise and other points in the Rockies. Americans, they stated, were reading the press entries as some of the outstanding holiday resorts in existence.

A British Columbia hen, a white Leghorn, has taken the world record in egg-laying with a total of 349 eggs given in 360 days. The hen was entered by the University of British Columbia in the Dominion Experimental Farm contest extending from November 1st last year to the same date this year. Previous egg-laying records were held by New Zealand (342 eggs per year), in 1923 and by Australia (347 eggs) in 1924. Last year the honor of establishing a record for this continent went to a hen in Puyallup, Washington, with 336 eggs laid in the year.

An excellent specimen of bull moose with an antler spread of 48 inches was secured recently in the woods of Nova Scotia by James W. Stuber, sportsman-editor of Columbus, Ohio, who headed an expedition into Nova Scotia for the purpose of securing exhibits for the Ohio State Museum. In reporting on his trip at the tourist department of the Canadian Pacific Railway in Montreal, where details of the expedition were arranged, Mr. Stuber stated that, according to guides and old residents in the district where the moose was killed, it was one of the finest specimens taken out in years.

Liner and Planes in 3000-mile Dash to Effect "Scoop"

Gertrude Ederle's recent victory over the English Channel, wrote up to the ship and placed a bundle of prints in the care of a passenger. Even the Commander of the ship was ignorant of their value until a radio message flashed in giving the instructions for the disposal of the prints. A seaman would pick them up near Anticosti Island. True to the arrangements the seaman was alerted a few miles from the island near English Bay, and Commander Latta gave instructions to an officer to wrap the photographs in a water-proof coat and lower them over the side of the ship. The seaman circled the ship and alighted. In a few minutes the package was picked up but the sea had become so choppy that it took the plane several hours to land in the lee of the island before it could rise. Finally taking flight it flew straight to Rimouski where the prints were divided and placed on board two waiting land planes. These two planes hopped off for New York and were hopeful of reaching New York for the Saturday edition of the News, but heavy fogs descended and killed all hopes. One of the planes was forced down at St. Etienne and success was up to the other pilot. After flying in the fog almost to Newport, it turned white and landed at Philadelphia and took other planes at the parade grounds there. Here the other plane took the pictures and began the last leg of the perilous flight to New York. Flying at 112 miles an hour through three electric storms and one of the heaviest fogs ever encountered by the flyers the plane landed at the West Side Park, Jersey City. A little over three hours after the final dash was begun the pictures were delivered at the offices of the News in New York 24 hours ahead of picture routes via New York.

Toronto—For the first time since silver foxes have been exhibited at the Royal Winter Fair here, Ontario breeders have seriously challenged the supremacy of the Prince Edward Island fox farmers.  
Immigration to Canada for the first nine months of the calendar year 1926 shows an increase of 66 per cent over the same period a year ago according to a statement issued recently by the Department of Immigration and Colonization.  
Moncton, New Brunswick—Frozen blueberries are now being shipped in quantity to Cleveland and other centres in the United States. So far eight carloads have left Moncton, and so that the fruit will remain frozen. Two more carloads are about to go forward.  
Victoria, British Columbia—Famous Players-Lasky are to establish a plant in British Columbia for film production, it was announced in connection with the \$15,000,000 concern known as the Famous Players-Canadian Corporation, Limited, of Toronto.  
Traffic in grain from Winnipeg along the Canadian Pacific Railway lines this year has been heavier than last year by over 12,000,000 bushels. With 110,288,085 bushels marketed and 63,010 cars loaded the increases over last year's ten month period were 12,188,437 bushels and 3,538 cars.  
Antwerp, Belgium—When the Canadian Pacific steamer Melita arrived recently, she was given an official welcome and a great popular demonstration as the ten thousandth vessel to enter the port of Antwerp this year. An elaborate programme was arranged in her
