### Older Boys' Parliament

**Met at Toronto During Holiday Week**  
The Ontario Older Boys' Parliament met during the week between Christmas and New Year, in the Parliament House and in Convocation Hall.  
Many bills and resolutions were passed by the youthful legislators which directly concerned the O.B.E.T. developments throughout Ontario. Considerable discussion was aroused by the introduction of a motion to change the name of the O.B.E.T. organization. Finally the motion was defeated, and constituted the only defeat the Government met with during the session.  
The most important bill was that concerning the Bond Selling System Campaign. This method of financing the boys' work, was successfully carried out last year. The bonds are of one dollar and five dollar denominations. The interest yielded is in paying the work of the boys through and the province program. The allocation for Halton county is \$75, and the boys feel certain that with the aid of the people they will be able to exceed this amount.  
The House was formally prorogued on Friday the 31st. On the whole the work accomplished by this last parliament exceeded that of any former parliament. It but remains for this great work to be carried out and it can be only carried out by the cooperation of all the fellow countrymen.  
Mr. John A. McDermid of Georgetown, who is member for Halton, was present at all the sessions.

### Elipses, 1927

In the year 1927 there will be five eclipses, three of the Sun and two of the Moon.  
I.—An Annular, not annular as one almanac has it, Eclipse of the Sun January 3rd, 1927, invisible in Canada.  
II.—Total Eclipse of the Moon, June 15th, 1927, visible in Toronto; the beginning visible generally in the Atlantic Ocean, N. America, except the northern border, S. America and the Pacific Ocean; ending visible generally in N. America except the north eastern, S. America except the extreme eastern part, the Pacific Ocean and Australia. In Toronto the Moon sets at 4.46 a.m. Magnitude of eclipse, 1.108 (Moon's diameter equals 1.0).  
III.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, June 29, 1927, invisible in Toronto, visible in England, Norway, the Arctic Ocean off the northern coasts of Europe and Asia and generally over the Arctic waters surrounding the N. pole and Greenland.  
IV.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, December 8th, 1927, invisible in Canada. Magnitude of Eclipse, 1.358 (Moon's diameter equals 1.0).  
V.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 24th, 1927, invisible in Toronto. Magnitude greatest eclipse 0.549 (Sun's diameter equals 1.0). Visible in southern latitudes.  
A transit of Mercury over the Sun's disk November 10th, 1927, invisible on the N. American continent. Visible over the Pacific Ocean.
