**Left Over to Assizes**  
 Objection was raised in weekly court last Thursday by S. F. Washington, K. C., to Mr. Justice Grant hearing a motion on behalf of Trafalgar township against the county of Halton. The motion was to quash county by-law number 543. The section objected to imposed rates on the township and rateable property therein, and a number of special rating by-laws, a number of which were in force in the county of Halton. The motion was in view of a case brought by Halton county against Trafalgar township in which all the trustees involved are named merely as attempt to sidetrack the issue.

 Albert Toet was re-appointed Reeve Chief at \$75 per year and Angus Duncan Deputy-Chief at \$15 per year.  
 E. McCannan was re-appointed assessor at a salary of \$225.  
 Angus Duncan was appointed a member of the High School Board for 1927-28-29.  
 J. L. Thompson was re-appointed a member of the Public Library Board.  
 Wm. Ward and E. Coleman were re-appointed pound keepers.
