



A Rollof Society Is Furnishing the Money to Carry on the Work of Presing Olds-Hehrun Hartel Is

Strange tales are being told by dark-eyed immigrant girls of occurrences that link London and the Asiatic city of Aleppo, and that are hurrying along the inevitable collapse of the harons in the household of the Turk, writes Barah MacDougall in the London Tit-Bits. Alepso, about 300 miles morth of

Jerusalem and just over the desert border from Turkey, is the centre of adventurous activities by which the harems are being depopulated at an unprecedented rate and the girls givon their liberty. This is being accomplished mainly through one of the straugest markets in the world, an agency where £1 is paid to anyone who brings in a young woman who has been rescued from a harem .. During the first nine months of 1926 they bought and paid for 2,000 girls-mostly attractive Armentan maideas, who were delivered at the doorstey of a comfortable hostel which continues to be their home unill they find congenial employment, or get married, or go back to their own people.

Ever since the League of Nations was given guardianable over girls coming out of hurems there had been a feeling that the work was progressing too slowly. At a meeting of the fox breeders of the Annapolis Valley, held at Middleton, it was stated that silver black foxes in captivity in the province number approximately 10,000 which, at a low valuation of \$200 each, makes a total value of \$2,000,-000. The annual revenue to the ranchers is placed at \$600,000.

What is practically the first short copper mined, refined and rolled in Canada is now at Regins to go on the roof of the new Canadian Pacific Hotel there.
