Miss E. M. Hall of New York is spending a few weeks with her sister Mrs. J. A. Thompson of Queen Street.

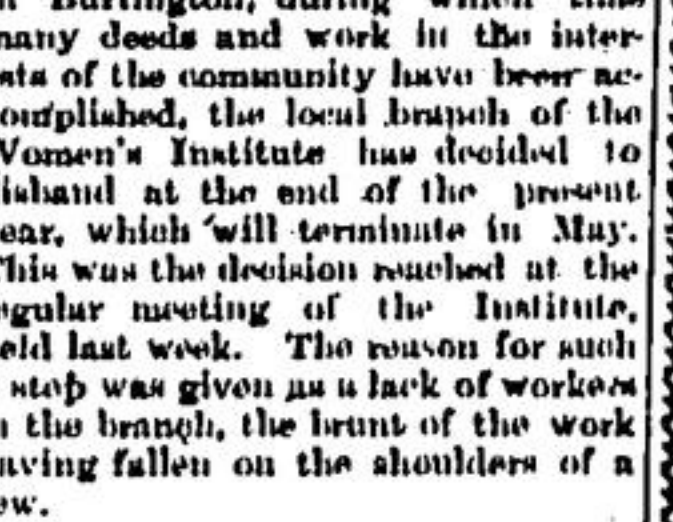

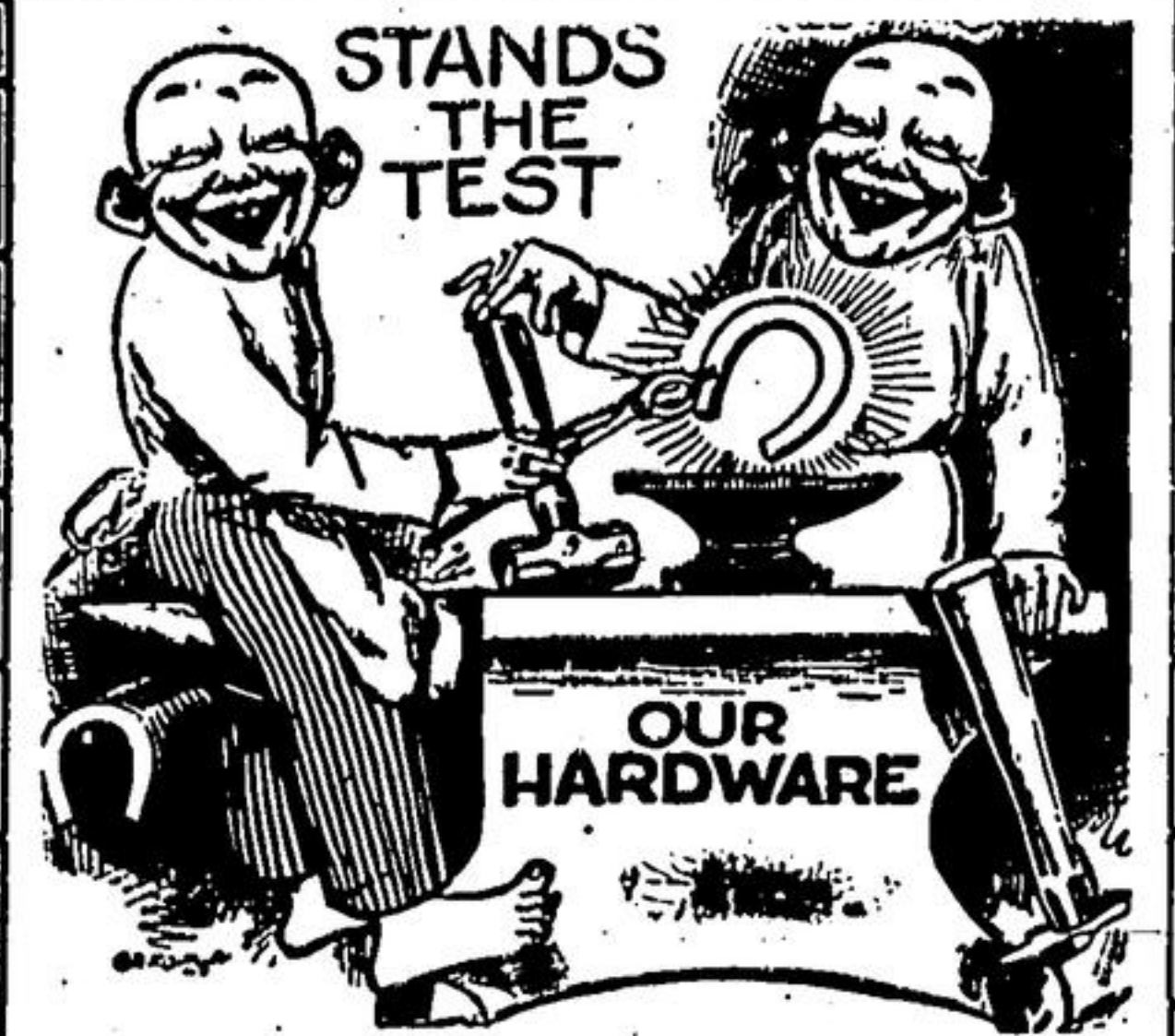
