Haltian Banquet Held at Regina

Memories of Old Times are exchanged at Social Functions

Sixty men and women who formerly lived in Halton County, Ontario, compared their memories of old friends and old times at a banquet held at the Hotel Champlain at Regina on March 15th. Milton, Oakville, Georgetown, Hamilton, Niagara Falls, Burlington and Nelson had their histories discussed by the groups at the banquet and by the speakers on the toast list. It was voted and passed unanimously that Halton County has held its own with any in the land in the number of its distinguished sons and daughters and in agricultural and industrial progress.

J. P. MacGregor, M.L.A., Vancouver, is president of the Halton Old Boys' and Girls' Association, and was in the chair last night. Mrs. Vernon Mason is secretary; Mrs. J. J. Wilson treasurer; Mrs. D. R. Lamont, Mrs. H. E. Cartwright and Percy E. Reed members of the social committee. Vernon Mason and Mrs. J. J. Wilson had charge of the register.

Dr. S. H. Corrigan, Lampaun; sent his regrets over not being able to attend the banquet, accompanied by a request for gifts of blossoms for the ladies present, and a short sketch of Halton as he remembered it. Special mention was made of the support lent by Dr. Corrigan to the plans for holding the re-union.

Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Francis and Miss Alice Rose were special guests. Mr. Francis had charge of the program of community singing and he gave a couple of tenor solos and was also heard in duets with Mrs. Lamont. His orchestration of the Ontario chorals, Jingle Bells, was one of the hits of the evening. Miss Rose presided at the piano, accompanying the singers and playing for the dancers later in the night.

Voice cautions greeted the small tables at which the guests sat in groups of four. The singing of "O, Canada" was followed by addresses given by Mr. MacGregor, Dr. Stephenson, R. E. Mack, Mr. Reed, Mr. Cowan, Inspector Coutts, and A. H. Gibbard, Moose Jaw. The history of Halton from the year 1784 was presented by the speakers, some tall tales being offered in the telling.

Making maple sugar, black-berrying in the underbrush, trout fishing, paring, bees, gun-hunting, courtship while buggery-riding, carding wool and spinning yarn, attending race meets on the 24th of May (if the weather was unfavorable for planting potatoes), and holding high carnival at the summer fair,—these were among the memories that were revived by the banqueters in happy mood.

What was accomplished by the pioneers of Halton and their successors in 125 years was well canvassed, and the opinion was expressed that if the present and coming generations of westerners possess the same sterling qualities as the men and women of Halton, then Saskatchewan on its 125th anniversary, will be as beautiful and as comfortable and homelike as Halton is now.

All the speakers voiced their pleasure over the committee making it possible for 60 old neighbors to find each other here and have a few hours together.
