On Friday evening last Rev. A. N. Frith the new pastor of the Baptist church was given a warm welcome by the congregation, local ministers and others.

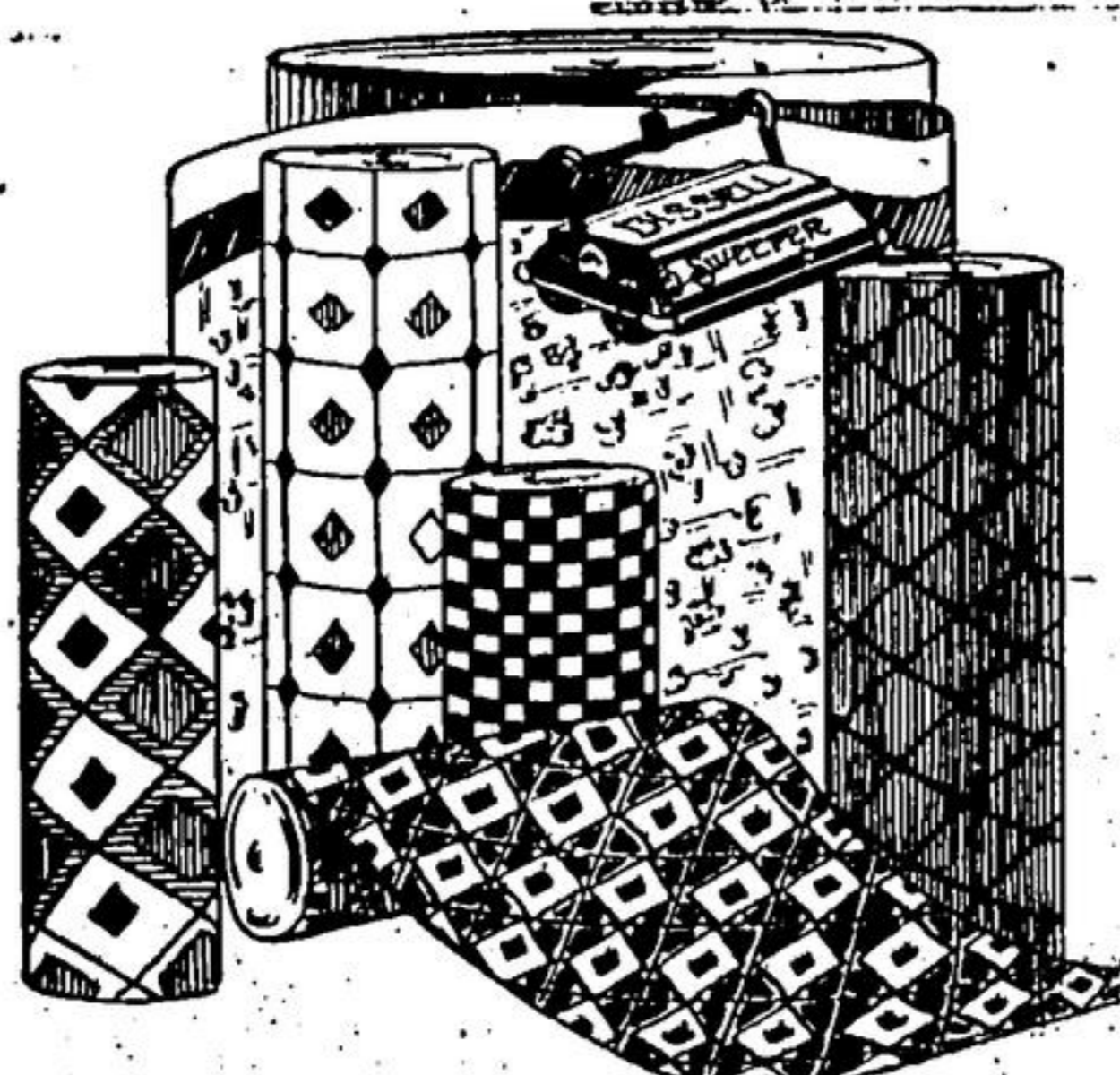
