### The Way Not to Be a Criminal

Mr. H. P. Moore of Acton, Ontario, tells in the Acton Free Press, of which he was fifty years the publisher, the story of a visit to Kingston where he with other magistrates, inspected the Portsmouth penitentiary. He says that Warden Ford made a significant statement to the visitors. It says: "None of you magistrates has ever sent me a mechanic in all the years since I have had charge here. The 25 men now imprisoned for two years or more without a useful trade, until we teach them a trade here. They are men who worked at odd jobs, often out of employment, with time on their hands, but none of them had served time learning a trade and steadily employed. We give them a chance to learn a trade, and help them to decide which trade they are best adapted for."

### Change in Hunting Season

Beer and Moose

The Ontario Government has announced a change in the open season for deer and moose this year, in that, either animal may be taken in the district south of the French and Mattawa rivers from November 1st to November 30th, and in the district north of the French and Mattawa from October 10th to November 30th. These periods are very much in favor of the hunter, especially if the weather may turn cold, and it is trusted the action of the government will result in a marked increase in the number of those taking to the woods. ### Preparing Stubble Land for Wheat

At the Brandon, Manitoba, Experimental Farm a great deal of experimental work has been carried out with regard to the methods of handling stubble land for wheat. In discussing the results of these investigations the superintendent of the farm states that it has been shown that early fall ploughing is superior to late ploughing both from the standpoint of yield and of weed control. Owing to the rush of spring work, fall ploughing is recommended over spring ploughing. If early fall ploughing is not possible practically as good results may be obtained by cultivating or disking the stubble at harvest prior to the fall ploughing. For increased returns, provided the land is clean, prepare a seed-bed without ploughing, by disking and cultivating the stubble both in the fall and in the spring. Bowing on the stubble without cultivation is to be avoided at all times.
