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

On the 23rd June, 1817, nine merchants of Montreal signed Articles of Association for the establishment of the "Montreal Bank." This action marked the foundation of the Rank of Montreal, which today holds the distinction of being by far the oldest institution of its kind in Bratish North America, and one of the largest financial institutions in the British Empire. It also established the beginning of the Canadian bank

To realize the conditions which prevailed when the Bank first brought organized financing to the relief of that early generation of Canadian business men, it is necessary to delve

The only organized portion of were the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada and the Maritime Provinces. Their whole population was less than 400,000, and that of Montreal, the chief trading centre, less than 20,000. The development of trade and agriculture was hampered by lack of facilities for exchange The corntry was too poor to afford the luxury of a metallic circulating medium, and not only American British and French, but also Portuguese and Spanish coins were legal subject to frequent variations. As a consequence, domestic trade was carried on principally by barter and exchange, and international trade
