**Obituary**

**William Henry Godfrey**  
William Henry Godfrey, the last survivor of the Fenian Raid of 1868, at Georgetown, passed away on Tuesday, Nov. 14th. He had been a resident of Georgetown for over twenty-five years. He was born in the county of Londonderry, Ireland, in the year 1844 and came with his parents to Canada in 1862. The voyage across the Atlantic occupying nine weeks and three days, and arrived in Georgetown by stage coach, there being no railroad built here in those days. He was the youngest member of the family and the last of his generation. When a young man he learned the trade of paper staining and color mixing with the firm of Barber Brothers and was employed with them as foreman until they gave up the business. He was fond of sports and was Captain of the first baseball club organized and an ardent cricketer. He was a member of the volunteer Fire Brigade for a number of years. Gardening was his hobby. As a soldier with the Fenian raid he served as Guard over the Fenian prisoners during the Great War and fitted out the soldiers who left here for overseas. He was a loyal and true friend to his comrades and on the fifteenth anniversary of the Fenian Raid he instituted a military decoration day by personally decorating the graves of the veterans of 1865 in Greenwood cemetery with flags and flowers.

The service on Friday at the home and St. George's Church of which he was a most faithful attendant and trustee) was conducted by the Rev. F. A. Wase. The funeral was a military one. The pall-bearers were Col. Brown, Major Grant, Major Hume, Major R. Q. M. G. Scott, G. M. Sheppard, Corp. Barnard, Corp. Herington. The Last Post being sounded by Bugler C. Willson. Sgt. Godfrey was eighty three years and three months old and had remained a bachelor, but his niece Miss Clara McConnell lived with him and cared for him for many years, and his nephew A. H. McConnell of Guelph spent all holidays with him. He also leaves a number of nephews and nieces.

Interment took place in the family plot in Mount Pleasant cemetery.

After being in poor health for some time Duncan Clark Tost, son of the late Henry Tost, passed away at his home on Charles St. on Sunday last. Deceased was born in Georgetown 64 years ago. When a young man he went to the Southern States where he spent 38 years, returning here some 6 years ago. Deceased was an honorable man, esteemed by all who knew him. Of the family two brothers and three sisters remain, William, Albert and Miss Tost, Georgetown; Mrs. Robt. Neill, New Liskeard; and Mrs. John Bell, Toronto. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon when the remains were interred in Greenwood Cemetery, the service being conducted by Rev. Kenneth MacLean. **Fall Assizes**

The County of Halton Fall Assizes opened at Milton on Monday, Hon. Mr. Justice Meredith presiding. There will be two jury, two non-jury and one criminal case as follows: July—1. A. A. Cowie vs. The Toronto Evening Telegram; 2. Donald M. Livingstone and Annie Livingstone vs. Brown's Transport. Non-jury—1. T. A. Reid, Amy. H. Reid and Eric Reid vs. Herbert Bird and Edward Gurry and Stewart Gurry. The criminal case is Rex vs. D'Angelo. Bert D'Angelo was convicted of manslaughter at the fall assizes here a year ago, and sentenced to Kingston penitentiary for four years. It is alleged that D'Angelo and the poison alcohol which caused the death of several men, in and near Oakville, who drank it. D'Angelo appealed the case and was granted a new trial by the Supreme Court. The prisoner has been confined in the county jail here since his arrest a year ago last July.
