Address on China

Dr. Murdoch Mackenzie, 38 years a missionary in North Honan, China, addressed a large gathering in the United Church, Georgetown, on Friday evening the 28th inst. Although a rapid and intense speaker the hour he took seemed all too short for him to bring home to his audience the high value he placed upon the Chinese, and the success of the work he had been privileged to witness in his labours among them. The present upheaval, he claimed, would pass, and after the necessary adjustments had been made, greater progress than ever would take place, God, undoubtedly, has great things in store for China.

Rev. Mr. Caldwell of Limehouse was on the platform and led the meeting in prayer. Mr. and Mrs. Harwell contributed a very enjoyable duet, and Miss Jean Adams presided acceptably at the organ. At the close on adjourning to the Sunday School room, light refreshments were served by the Stewards and an hour of social intercourse was enjoyed. Dr. and Mrs. Mackenzie were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. R. I. Creelman during their stay in town, and returned to Toronto by the ten o'clock train on the same night.

Prisoners and Lashes Given Bank Bail

Police Magistrate H. P. Moore held a special sitting in the Court House, Milton, on Monday, when Jack Walker, William Duncan, Clarence Thomas and Arthur Williams, all of Toronto, were charged with robbing, under arms, the Campbellville branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia of \$1,100 on Oct. 28 last. Crown Attorney W. I. Dick acted as prosecutor. The prisoners were not represented by counsel. Walker, Thomas and Williams admitted their guilt, but Duncan, alleged driver of the bandit car, pleaded not guilty. After hearing the evidence Duncan was found guilty and sentence on the four was imposed. Jack Walker was given 15 years in Kingston Penitentiary; Clarence Thomas, 15 years in Kingston Penitentiary and 20 lashes; Arthur Williams, 15 years in Kingston Penitentiary and 20 lashes; and William Duncan, 10 years in Kingston Penitentiary and 20 lashes. No flogging was included in Walker's sentence, as the Magistrate felt that enough lashes had been added to his sentence in Toronto last week. After receiving their heavy sentence all four prisoners were taken back to Toronto jail, where they will await transfer to Kingston Penitentiary. The bank robbers, all heavily shackled and securely handcuffed, were brought in a car to Milton from Toronto by five detectives, who kept a close watch on their prisoners during the trial.

After reading the names of the nominees Town Clerk Heath was appointed chairman and called on the following who addressed the meeting: Mayor McIntyre reviewed the financial statement explaining the various items and spoke regarding town affairs generally. He defended the milk by-law and solicited the support of the ratepayers for 1928. If elected his policy would be as in the past year, the careful handling of the finances and other affairs of the municipality. He replied to several questions from ratepayers regarding the milk by-law.

Reeve Near thought the present milk by-law was too drastic and favored the recommendation made to the Council by the delegation of milk dealers. He also spoke regarding the work at County Council.

Councillor Kelly spoke briefly regarding the finances of the town. He was in favor of the pasteurization by-law and believed it was in the best interests of the health of the town and if elected would support it.

Councillor Ashenhurst did not vote for the milk by-law. He had been a member of Council for the past five years and if elected would continue to serve the town to the best of his ability.

W. C. Hesseby said he had drank raw milk all his life and did not see the necessity for pasteurization. If elected he would oppose the pasteurization by-law.

L. F. Denison as chairman of the Industrial Committee had been the means of locating a new industry in town by the sale of the Corke property and had two more in view. He was a supporter of the milk by-law and believed it in the best interests of the community. If elected he would give the town his best services.

Le Roy Dale at the solicitations of friends had again appeared before the ratepayers. He explained some items in the financial statement which he said were misleading, and thought Council should have got sanction of the people before passing milk by-law. He was a candidate for Mayor for 1928 and solicited the support of the ratepayers.

Mayor McIntyre in reply stated that the statement as read was absolutely correct with the exception of a Public Library item which was unintentionally omitted.
