Miss Helen Perry of Toronto, Baptist Secretary of girls work for Ontario and Quebec and Miss Muriel Simpson also of Toronto were in charge of the conference.

The conference opened Friday evening at seven with the registration of delegates, which was in charge of Miss Muriel Kennedy, conference registrar.

A warm welcome was extended to the out of town girls by Miss Isabel McDermid, chairman of the evening and was responded to by Miss Mary Stewart of Brampton.

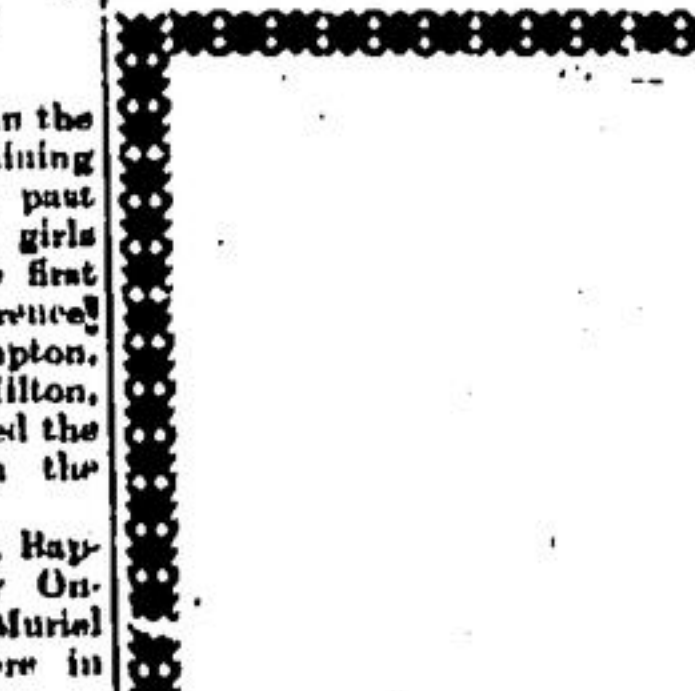
