

Train Wreck at Acton

Three freight cars were piled up and two others off the track near the station at Acton, and the C. N. R. main line between Toronto and Stratford was blocked for several hours last Thursday morning. A long freight train came to grief at 6:45 a.m. when one of the middle cars missed the switch. No one was injured.

The wreck occurred twenty minutes before the fast passenger train from the west was due to pass through Acton. The trainmen succeeded in stopping it in time and it rolled slowly.

When the 7:55 train for the west arrived it was turned back to Toronto after the passengers of both trains had been transferred, and the other train proceeding west.

Insanely Cases at Old People's Home

The admission of eight patients from hospitals for the insane to the Halton-Well Old People's Home is creating a difficulty for the home and causing the county council of Peel and Halton a great deal of trouble to meet the contingency. Six are Halton patients and two of Peel. W. N. Riddell, chairman of the House of Refuge committee, made his report yesterday and it includes a recommendation that something should be done to relieve the situation. The home has no facilities or sufficient help to take care of the patients in question and a request will likely be made that not only no more patients be sent to the Home but also that those already committed be returned to hospitals where there are proper facilities for looking after them.

Christmas seals must not appear on the front of an envelope to be sent through the mail. This is against postal regulations, and the authorities must send such letters to the dead letter office. Postmasters must request that all citizens who use Christmas stamps place them on the back of the envelope.

General News

Anybody can own a lot at Port McNicol. At a tax sale, the other day lots were sold all the way from 25 cents to \$1.50.

The first event of its kind in the General and Marine Hospital Owen Sound was the birth of triplets to Mrs. G. G. Washburn of Owen Sound on December 3rd. The mother and her two daughters and a son are all doing well.

The explosion of a plumber's blow torch in the home of Emerson Smith at Fort William, Tuesday, resulted in the injury of four people.

England and Germany on Dec. 3rd shook hands, musically speaking, when for the first time since the war one of Germany's noted orchestras—the Berlin Philharmonic—visited London and got a great reception from an audience which packed Queen's Hall in Regent street.

Most of the pollen that is used in hay fever remedies made in the United States is grown by several growers in their laboratory in the San Fernando Valley, in Southern California. When finally prepared for use, the pollen is worth more than its weight in gold.

United States customs officials have started an offensive against "hip" run runners, at Niagara Falls, men who, while going to work daily across the river, take over a bottle of whiskey for sale there. Within the last few hours of searching, the officers collected 21 bottles of Canadian whiskey, concealed in pockets and inside coats. They were fined \$5 each and the liquor confiscated.

Col. F. H. Deacon, of Toronto, besides being a prominent dealer in stocks and bonds, is also the owner of a large farm near the city and a successful Shorthorn breeder. Last week, at the Chicago Live Stock Show, the top price paid for bulls was \$4,000 by a man who he paid \$4,000 for Edellyn Farms, grand champion bull of the exposition, and owned by the Edellyn Farms, of Wilson, Ill.

Notes and Comments

THE time is coming, and soon when the province is going to meet an insistent demand from the municipalities for a share of the revenue from motor cars. Every town and city in Ontario has had to assume a tremendous debt to make streets fit for motor car traffic and the ratepayers of those municipalities facing as well large expenditures for new schools on account of the compulsory attendance of children up to 16 years of age, a law passed at Toronto, are in need of relief.—St. Catharines Standard.
